

the first athletics program in the nation to reach the century mark. The ARIZONA STATE women claimed both indoor and outdoor track & field NCAA titles. The feat marked just the 13th time in NCAA women's history that a team has won both the indoor and outdoor team titles in the same year. STANFORD picked up two national championships, securing the men's golf title, as well as the women's cross country crown, its second in as many years.

On the men's side, Pac-10 members have won 254 NCAA team championships, far ahead of the 195 claimed by the runner-up Big Ten. Men's NCAA crowns have come at a phenomenal rate for the Pac-10 - 15 basketball titles by five schools (more than any other conference), 49 tennis titles, 45 outdoor track and field crowns, and 26 baseball titles. Pac-10 members have won 25 of the last 38 NCAA titles in volleyball, 33 of the last 48 in water polo, and 20 total swimming and diving national championships.

Individually, the Conference has produced an impressive number of NCAA men's individual champions as well, claiming 1,140 NCAA individual crowns.

On the women's side, the story is much the same. Since the NCAA began conducting women's championships 26 years ago, Pac-10 members have claimed at least four national titles in a single season on 18 occasions. Overall, the Pac-10 has captured 105 NCAA women's crowns, easily outdistancing the SEC, which is second with 70. Pac-10 members have dominated a number of sports, winning 19 softball titles, 17 tennis crowns, 11 of the last 17 volleyball titles, 11 of the last 18 trophies in golf and eight in swimming and diving.

Pac-10 women athletes shine nationally on an individual basis as well, having captured an unmatched 484 NCAA individual titles, an average of more than 18 champions per season.

The roots of the Pacific-10 Conference date back over 90 years to December 2, 1915, when the Pacific Coast Conference (PCC) was founded at a meeting at the Oregon Hotel in Portland, Ore. Original membership consisted of four schools - the University of California at Berkeley, the University of Washington, the University of Oregon, and Oregon State College (now Oregon State University). All still are charter members of the Conference.

Pacific Coast Conference play began in 1916. One year later, Washington State College (now Washington State University), was accepted into the Conference, and Stanford University joined in 1918.

In 1922, the PCC expanded to eight teams with the admission of the University of Southern California and the

University of Idaho. Montana joined the Conference in 1924, and in 1928, the PCC grew to 10 members with the addition of UCLA.

The Pacific Coast Conference competed as a 10-team league until 1950, with the exception of 1943-45, when World War II curtailed intercollegiate athletic competition to a minimum. In 1950, Montana resigned from the Conference and joined the Mountain States Conference. The PCC continued as a nine-team Conference through 1958.

In 1959, the PCC was dissolved and a new Conference was formed - the Athletic Association of Western Universities. Original AAWU membership consisted of California, Stanford, Southern California, UCLA, and Washington. Washington State became a member in 1962, while Oregon and Oregon State joined in 1964. In 1968, the name Pacific-8 Conference was adopted.

Ten years later, on July 1, 1978, the University of Arizona and Arizona State University were admitted and the Pacific-10 Conference became a reality. In 1986-87, the league took on a new look, expanding to include 10 women's sports.

Currently, the Pac-10 sponsors 11 men's sports and 11 women's sports. Additionally, the Conference is a member of the Mountain Pacific Sports Federation (MPSF) in four other men's sports and two other women's sports.

Edwin N. Atherton was named the Conference's first Commissioner in 1940. He has been succeeded by Victor O. Schmidt (1944), Thomas J. Hamilton (1959), Wiles Hallock (1971), and current Commissioner Thomas C. Hansen in 1983.

The Pacific-10 Conference offices are located 25 miles east of San Francisco in Walnut Creek, Calif.

# 13 Original Rules of Basketball

1. The ball may be thrown in any direction with one or both hands.
2. The ball may be batted in any direction with one or both hands (never with the fist).
3. A player cannot run with the ball. The player must throw it from the spot on which he catches it, allowance to be made for a man who catches the ball when running at a good speed if he tries to stop.
4. The ball must be held in or between the hands; the arms or body must not be used for holding it.
5. No shouldering, holding, pushing, tripping, or striking in any way the person of an opponent shall be allowed; the first infringement of this rule by any player shall count as a foul, the second shall disqualify him until the next goal is made, or, if there was evident intent to injure the person, for the whole of the game, no substitute allowed.
6. A foul is striking at the ball with the fist, violation of Rules 3,4, and such as described in Rule 5.
7. If either side makes three consecutive fouls, it shall count a goal for the opponents (consecutive means without the opponents in the mean time making a foul).
8. A goal shall be made when the ball is thrown or batted from the grounds into the basket and stays there, providing those defending the goal do not touch or disturb the goal. If the ball rests on the edges, and the opponent moves the basket, it shall count as a goal.
9. When the ball goes out of bounds, it shall be thrown into the field of play by the person first touching it. In case of a dispute, the umpire shall throw it straight into the field. The thrower-in is allowed five seconds; if he holds it longer, it shall go to the opponent. If any side persists in delaying the game, the umpire shall call a foul on that side.
10. The umpire shall be judge of the men and shall note the fouls and notify the referee when three consecutive fouls have been made. He shall have power to disqualify men according to Rule 5.
11. The referee shall be judge of the ball and shall decide when the ball is in play, in bounds, to which side it belongs, and shall keep the time. He shall decide when a goal has been made, and keep account of the goals with any other duties that are usually performed by a referee.
12. The time shall be two 15-minute halves, with five minutes' rest between.
13. The side making the most goals in that time shall be declared the winner. In case of a draw, the game may, by agreement of the captains, be continued until another goal is made.



*Note: The original rules of basketball were written by Dr. James Naismith in December, 1891 in Springfield, Mass. These original rules were published in January, 1892 in the Springfield College school newspaper, The Triangle.*

## THE BEGINNING

A basketball team representing Washington Agricultural College and School of Science took the floor for the first time Dec. 7, 1901. The college was just nine years old, the school colors had only recently been changed from pink and blue to crimson and gray, and the game was played against a YMCA team in Spokane because Washington Agricultural College did not have a gymnasium. The Washington Agricultural College coach was John B. Evans, a senior student who would graduate with the class of '02, six months after that first game. The final score was YMCA 31, Washington Agricultural College 0.

In a return game Feb. 17, 1902, dedicating the first gymnasium on campus, situated where New Holland Library is today, John Palmerton, from Pullman, scored the first basket for the college, but it came in a losing effort once again. The final was YMCA 24, Washington Agricultural College 16.

"Coach" Evans remained for one season following his graduation, and his second team earned a place in Washington State's sports history books by defeating that pesky Spokane YMCA quintet 18-13 Dec. 13, 1902.

Professional basketball coaches were few and far between in the early 1900s, particularly in the Wild West. Washington Agricultural College football coaches James Ashmore, Everett Sweeley and John Bender followed Evans as the basketball coaches over the next five seasons, compiling a respectable record of 42 wins against 27 losses. It was not until the arrival of J. Fred "Doc" Bohler in 1908, as physical director—and coach of all sports—that the basketball program at the now State College of Washington (as of 1905) got some continuity.

Over the 103 years of basketball now recorded at Washington State University, only four coaches have remained for more than 10 seasons. Here is a look at those in order, with a few notes on others who have coached the Cougars.

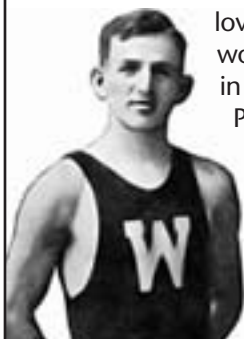
## BOHLER'S ERA

Cougar basketball jumped into the Major Leagues soon after "Doc" Bohler's arrival on the Palouse.

Despite the fact he was coaching just about everything at Washington State in those days—basketball, baseball, track—and acting as athletic director and trainer (the latter earned him his "Doctorate")—Bohler's greatest love was basketball. He had starred for the world champion YMCA team in Reading, Pa., in 1906, just two years prior to coming to Pullman as physical director and coach.

In 1916, Washington State's basketball team was 18-3 and won the Northwest League title for the first time. Bohler did it with a team mostly made up of home-

grown players. The starting five consisted of Ivan Price and the Moss brothers, Norm and Bob, all three from Pullman, Eddie Copeland of Walla Walla, and Bohler's brother Roy from Pennsylvania.

Washington State was even better in 1917. Bohler's team won the newly formed Pacific Coast Conference with virtually the same lineup, plus Glenn Glover, another Pullman product. Price and Roy Bohler made all-conference.

With a final season record of 25-1 (the lone loss was to California in Berkeley, and WSC beat the Bears the following night), the Helms Athletic Foundation declared State national champions at the conclusion of that great season which saw WSC play 18 of its 26 games on the road.

"Doc" Bohler's record over 18 seasons (1909-26) was 226-177 for a .561 winning percentage, second best among all Cougar basketball coaches with more than two seasons at the helm.

McClellan "Chick" Rockey, a forward on the Bohler teams of 1918-21, was the only All-Pacific Coast Conference selection from Washington State in the Bohler era. "Chick" was selected in 1919 and 1920.

## THE FRIEL DYNASTY

Jack Friel had more nicknames than any other coach at Washington State. He was "The Fox of the Palouse," "The Silver Fox," and, late in his 30-year career, "The Prune." Most of all, he was a coaching genius!

Friel had never coached a college game when he took over Washington State's ailing basketball program for the 1929 season. Jack had played under "Doc" Bohler from 1921-23, and his team at North Central High School in Spokane won the school's first State championship in 1928.

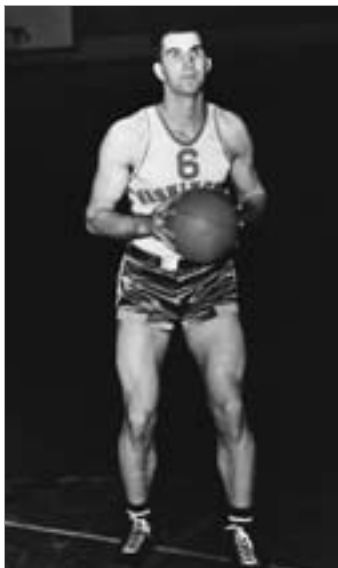
After Bohler gave up coaching, because of pressing duties as athletic director and head of WSC's physical education program, WSC track coach Karl Schlademan took over for two seasons, posting a record of 18-27 before the arrival of Friel.

Friel had a losing season in his first year, before his teams posted five straight marks above .500. The 1932 team finished 22-5 and was runner-up for the Northern Division title of the Pacific Coast Conference. To this day, Friel is the winningest Washington State basketball coach, and has a career best winning percentage, .568 (872-495) over 30 seasons

(1929-58).

That is why the playing floor at Beasley Performing Arts Coliseum, "Friel Court," is named in his honor.

In 2003, Friel was inducted into the Pacific-10 Conference Hall of Honor.

Every Cougar remembers Jack's great team of 1941, but his '37 club, led by all-conference center Ivar Nelson, won the Northern Division of the Pacific Coast in a miracle finish.

The Cougars won a three-way playoff vs. Washington in Seattle, and Oregon in Bohler Gym, and then met Stanford with its all-time greatest Angelo "Hank" Luisetti for the Pacific Coast crown.

Old Cougars tell how "Stanford won (31-28 and 41-40), but Nelson outscored Luisetti (19-18)!"

In 1941, Friel got his revenge. The Cougars won the Northern Division with a 13-3 mark and defeated Stanford two straight for the Pacific Coast title.

Washington State then beat Creighton (48-39) in the NCAA tournament and stunned tournament favorite Arkansas (64-53) to advance to the championship game.

Wisconsin knocked off WSC 39-34 in the title game in Kansas City, Mo., to deny the Cougars a national championship.

Two members of that '41 team, center Paul Lindemann and guard Ray Sundquist, were named All-Pacific Coast Conference. Lindemann and Sundquist, along with Art McLarney (1930), Huntly Gordon (1932), Ivar Nelson (1937), Gale Bishop (1943), and Larry Beck 1956 and 1957) were named All-PCC during coach Friel's years. Vince Hanson set an NCAA scoring record in 1945 with 592 points and was named All-American, but the PCC all-star selections were discontinued in 1944 and not resumed until 1956.

One of the truly great innovators of basketball, coach Friel introduced a "two-platoon" system, where he would

substitute by units, and he forced his opposition—even the talent rich John Wooden teams at UCLA—to do the same. Friel was also instrumental in the adoption of the "one-and-one" rule on free throws.

Coach Friel won his final Northern Division title in 1950 with a splendid collection of all-around athletes who made his "two-platoon" philosophy flourish. Four of the starting five—Bob Gambold, Gene Conley, Ted Tappe and Leon Mangis—lettered in two sports, and the fifth, forward Ed Gayda, Friel always said was one of the most talented he coached in his 30 years. In the second platoon, Eric Roberts and Gordy Brunswick were two-sport stars, and Frank Mataya lettered in football, basketball, track and baseball during his amazing career at Washington State.

Several years later, Gene Conley became the first athlete to play on world championship teams in two sports. He played center for the Boston Celtics when they won the NBA and pitched for the Milwaukee Braves who captured the World Series. Ted Tappe also played professional baseball, and hit a home run for the Cincinnati Reds in his first at-bat in the Major Leagues.

Friel's Cougars romped through the Northern Division in 1950, winning by three games over Washington and Oregon State. But the luck of the draw put the playoffs on the home court of Southern Division winner UCLA.

"They trapped us in a handball court," Conley said years later. He was referring to the gymnasium at Westwood that made Bohler Gym back in Pullman look like the Staples Center.

UCLA won the opener 60-58 on a 50-foot heave at the buzzer by forward Ralph Joeckel, and claimed the series 52-49 the following night to give John Wooden his first Pacific Coast Conference title.

Players making All-Northern Division in the Friel years included Art McLarney, Claud Holsten, Huntly Gordon, Ken Wills, Huntley McPhee, Jack Holstine, Jack Jennings, Bud Olson, Ray Sundquist, Vern Butts, Gale Bishop, Paul Lindemann, Marv Gilberg, Vince Hanson, Bob Sheridan, Ed Gayda, Gene Conley, Bob Gambold, Ron Bennink and Larry Beck.

## HARSHMAN AND HEATHCOTE

Marv Harshman came to Washington State following an illustrious career as athlete and coach at Pacific Lutheran University and took over for the retired Jack Friel in 1959. It took Harshman seven seasons to post a winning record, but in all fairness to Marv, it should be pointed out that the old Pacific Coast Conference broke up in his first season, making his recruiting task very difficult as an "Independent." It was not until the 1965 season, with the addition of one of Jack Friel's old platoon "hatchet men," George "Jud" Heathcote, that Marv had a full-time assistant. From that point on, Harshman and Heathcote turned the Cougar program around.

Among the highlights of the Harshman-Heathcote years at Washington State were opening round wins over West Virginia, Princeton and Syracuse in the Far West Classics of 1966-68 when all three of the eastern teams were highly regarded. These were also the seasons during which center Jim McKean was setting all sorts of school scoring and rebounding records for the Cougars while Ray Stein and Lenny Allen were wowing fans with their blazing fast-breaks. McKean made the All-Pacific-8 Conference team in both 1967 and

1968. Ted Wierman followed McKean as the Pac-8 center in 1969 and Rick Erickson won the honor at guard in 1970.

The top three rebounders in Washington State history played for Harshman-Heathcote in McKean (11.0 rpg), Charlie Sells (10.88 rpg) and Ted Werner (10.87 rpg).

Washington State scored one of its rare victories over UCLA in 1966, defeating the Bruins 84-83 at Pullman. The Cougars had near misses vs. number-one ranked UCLA in 1970 and 1971, losing 72-70 and 57-53 in the din-bin that was old Bohler Gym.

Harshman left WSU for the University of Washington following the 1971 season, and Heathcote took the head job at the University of Montana. Just eight seasons later, in 1979, Heathcote worked a little magic at Michigan State with Earvin Johnson and defeated Larry Bird and Indiana State for the NCAA championship.

## RAVELING'S REVIEW

George Raveling became the head basketball coach at Washington State for the 1973 season, following a one-year stint by Bob Greenwood. (Greenwood went 11-15 in his only season with the Cougars, but his 1972 team upset both Michigan and New Mexico before losing to Florida State in the finals of the 1971 Far West Classic at Portland. Dan Steward led the Cougar scorers that season with a 16.3 average).

Raveling, who played at Villanova, came to WSU from Maryland, where he had been an assistant under "Lefty" Driesell. George closed historic Bohler Gym (capacity 5,600) following the 1973 season and opened Washington State's Beasley Performing Arts Coliseum (then capacity 12,058) Dec. 1, 1973 with an 80-78 win over Louisiana State. (The game was also noteworthy because LSU coach Dale Brown served as an assistant under Bob Greenwood at WSU during the 1972 season).

Raveling's WSU teams improved rapidly from the 6-20 mark in his first season, and in 1980 the Cougars finished the regular season and made their first appearance in the NCAA tournament since Jack Friel's 1941 team went to the final. WSU's postseason was cut short with a 62-55 loss to Pennsylvania in the first round in West Lafayette, Ind.

The Cougars were back in the "Big Dance" in 1983, and defeated Weber State 62-52 in the first round in Boise, Idaho before dropping a narrow 54-49 decision to fourth-ranked Virginia.

The Cougars finished 23-7 that season and earned Raveling a new job—at Iowa, succeeding Lute Olson, who moved on to Arizona.

Stars of the Raveling years at Washington State include Steve Puidokas, Don Collins, Craig Ehlo and James Donaldson. Puidokas made the All-Pacific-8 team four straight seasons between 1974-77 and still holds a flock of Cougar career records, including rebounds, field goals, and scoring average (18.6 ppg). Collins, Bryan Rison and Steve Harriel were All-Pacific-10 choices under Raveling, and Donaldson and Ehlo went on to play in the NBA for many years.

George Raveling's 13-year record at Washington State (167-136) is third best in the Cougars' books, following Jack Friel and "Doc" Bohler.

## STEVENS TO GRAHAM

Len Stevens was an assistant to George Raveling and moved up to become head coach of the Cougars in 1984 upon Raveling's departure. Stevens directed the program for four seasons (48-67, with a best of 15-16 in 1986) before giving way to one of his own assistants, Kelvin Sampson, for the 1988 campaign. Keith "Scooter" Morrison was the top performer for the Cougars under Stevens, making the All-Pacific-10 team twice, 1985 and 1986.

Kelvin Sampson took the Cougars to the National Invitational Tournament (NIT) for the first time in 1992 after a 9-9 finish in the Pacific-10. WSU defeated Minnesota 72-70 in Pullman in the first round, before losing to New Mexico 79-71 in Albuquerque. The Cougars finished 22-11.

WSU was back in the NCAA tourney in 1994 after a 20-10 finish in the regular season, but lost in the opening round 67-64 to Boston College. The Cougars then lost their head coach to the University of Oklahoma. Sampson left WSU

after a seven-year span with a .500 mark (103-103).

Stars of the Sampson era at Washington State included Brian Quinnett, Terrence Lewis, Bennie Seltzer and Mark Hendrickson. The latter three were selected All-Pacific-10 Conference while Hendrickson, Seltzer and Quinnett rank fourth, sixth and eighth, respectively, on WSU's all-time scoring list.

Kevin Eastman, head coach at North Carolina-Wilmington, succeeded Sampson at Washington State for the 1995 season, inheriting both Hendrickson and Isaac Fontaine, who became two-time All-Pacific-10 choices.

Eastman's first two teams at Washington State went to the NIT, the 1995 club posting an 18-12 record and reaching the quarterfinals with wins over Texas Tech and Illinois State before losing to Canisius. In 1996, Eastman's team was 18-11 and defeated Gonzaga 92-73 in the first round of the NIT in Pullman. WSU was eliminated from the tournament with an 82-73 loss to Nebraska in Lincoln.

Eastman left after the 1999 season with a five-year record of 69-78. Along with Hendrickson and Fontaine, Carlos Daniel earned All-Pacific-10 Conference honors under Eastman, garnering the selection in 1998.

Paul Graham replaced Eastman and posted a 31-79 record in four years at the Cougars' head coach. The highlight of his tenure came in 2000-01 when WSU posted 12 wins and garnered its best Pac-10 finish in six seasons. That season, J Locklier was named Pacific-10 Conference New-comer of the Year, Mike Bush earned Honorable Mention All-Pac-10, and Marcus Moore occupied a spot on the Pac-10 All-Freshman Team.

## THE BENNETTS' IMPACT

Officially joining the Cougar family March 29, 2003, Dick Bennett brought with him over 35 years of experience in coaching to the men's basketball program. After successfully rebuilding programs at Wisconsin-Stevens Point, an NAIA school, Wisconsin-Green Bay, and Wisconsin, Bennett was a perfect fit for a struggling WSU program.

In Bennett's first year as a Cougar the team improved on its previous season by six wins, posting a 13-16 record. During the season WSU broke a number of streaks, many of them on the road. These achievements included winning at Alaska Fairbanks to break a 27-game road losing streak, beating UCLA on the road for the first time in 47 tries and ending a 22-game road losing streak in the Pac-10 at California.

The Cougars also swept season series against USC, Arizona State, and California. This marked the first time since 1994-95 that WSU had swept three Pac-10 opponents. The Cougars finished the season ranked nationally in scoring defense (12th, 59.7), free throw percentage (13th, 74.9), and fewest turnovers (14th, 12.1). Finally, during the week of Feb. 2-8 WSU was named men's basketball national team of the week by ESPN following wins at UCLA and USC.

Season two at WSU for Bennett saw more growth in the program. The Cougars won at No. 11 Arizona Jan. 29 to break a 38-game losing streak versus the Wildcats. This win also ended a 20-game road losing streak against the team directed by Lute Olsen. Another highlight of the

2004-05 season was a home-and-home sweep of Stanford, which broke overall and road losing skids of 17 and eight, respectively against the Cardinal.

Other improvements during the 2004-05 season included advancing to a second straight Pac-10 tournament and tying for sixth place in the Pac-10, the best finish since 2000-01. Over the course of the season WSU continued to close the gap on a winning record with a dozen games decided by three points or less. The Cougars improved over their previous season's ranking and ended ranked sixth nationally in scoring defense, allowing only 56.9 points a game. This was the least allowed by a Pac-10 team in 21 years.

Individually, Thomas Kelati became the first Cougar in seven years to be named All-Pac-10 First Team. The Walla Walla native finished his career 18th in WSU history with 1,081 points and second in 3-pointers with 232. Robbie Cowgill and Derrick Low were named Pac-10 All-Freshman honorable mention.

Bennett returned to WSU for his third and final season as a head coach determined to finish the rebuilding process. The most remarkable achievement of the 2005-06 season was a sweep of arch rival Washington. Not only did this mark the first sweep of the Huskies since 1994, but was also the first home win against a ranked opponent (77-64 vs. No. 16 Washington) since beating No. 25 California during the 1996-97 season. The win at Hec Edmundson Pavilion against No. 10 Washington was the first against a top 10 team in 57 road games, and ended a 34-game overall skid against top 10 teams. The Cougars led the Pac-10 in three defensive categories: scoring defense, field goal percentage defense, and 3-point field goal percentage defense.

A 2005 *Hoop Scoop* ranking of college coaches landed Dick Bennett at No. 9. By ending his coaching career with an overall record of 490-306 (.616) in 27 years of coaching at the collegiate level, Dick Bennett demonstrated that he was deserving of this honor. His knowledge of basketball will continue to enhance the WSU men's basketball program through his son, Tony who took the WSU head coaching position at the conclusion of the 2005-06 season.

Tony Bennett made an immediate impact on the Washington State basketball program after taking the reigns from his father. In just his first season at the helm for the Cougars, the younger Bennett completed one of the greatest turnarounds, as the team went from 10<sup>th</sup> in the Pac-10 in 2005-06 to second in 2006-07.

Chosen to finish last in the Pacific-10 Conference prior to the season, the Cougars surprised everyone, finishing second in the league with a 13-5 mark. WSU's second-place finish equaled its best in Pac-10 history, matching the finish by the 1982-83 squad. Washington State's 26 overall wins matched the most in school history, equaling the wins of the NCAA runner-up 1940-41 team.

In Bennett's first season, the Cougars reached the NCAA Tournament for just the fifth time in school history and the first time since 1994. WSU also posted its first NCAA Tournament win since 1983, defeating Oral Roberts, 70-54, Match 15 in Sacramento, Calif. Washington State fell to Vanderbilt, 78-74 in double-overtime in the second round of the tournament, March 17.

The magical saw WSU finish in the top 25 in both the Associated Press and ESPN/USA Today polls, finishing 13<sup>th</sup> in the AP Poll

and 17<sup>th</sup> in the ESPN/USA Today poll. The Cougars began receiving votes after upsetting then-No. 18 Gonzaga, 77-67, Dec. 5 and jumped into the rankings at No. 22, Jan. 8, marking its first appearance in the poll since Feb. 1983.

The season of WSU milestones continued, as two of Bennett's key recruits from his first year as an assistant coach, Derrick Low and Kyle Weaver, received All-Pacific-10 Conference and National Association of Basketball Coaches District 14 First Team accolades, making them the first WSU duo to earn all-conference honors since 1995-96. Low added United States Basketball Writers Association District 9 first team honors, while Weaver was named MVP of the Pac-10 by Collegeinsider.com. Under Bennett's guidance, redshirt-sophomore Daven Harmeling became just the second Cougar to receive Pac-10 Player of the Week accolades twice (Jan. 29-Feb. 4, Dec. 4-10) after his performances against No. 20 Arizona (Feb. 1) and No. 18 Gonzaga (Dec. 5).

Also in 2006-07, Bennett guided his young Cougar squad to wins over five ranked opponents including No. 18 Gonzaga (Dec. 5), No. 7 Arizona (Jan. 6), No. 20 Arizona (Feb. 1), No. 25 Stanford (Feb. 8) and No. 23 USC (March 3). The five wins over ranked opponents matched the most in school history, equaling the 1994-95 team.

At the conclusion of the 2006-07 season, Bennett became the most decorated Pacific-10 coach in a single season with nine national coach of the year awards, including the accolades from the Associated Press. He also became just the third WSU head coach to pick up Pac-10 Coach of the Year honors.



## 1916-1917

### NATIONAL CHAMPIONS; NATIONAL HEROES

Dating back to the beginning of the 20th Century, the Washington State men's basketball program has a long and storied history.

With every season that makes up this history, a different story is told, unique to any other.

In 1917, a team from the Pullman campus accomplished feats so exceptional; on the court and off, that while time may do its best to erode the memories of the team's deeds, the 1917 season will always hold an extraordinary place in the history of Washington State Athletics.

The achievements came through the hard work, resolve, and courage demonstrated by the players throughout the course of the season. A year later, the same traits were applied by many members of the team in a much different battle, half a world away, against a different type of opposition, as four of the five players fought in World War I.

The 1917 team's performance on the court was that of champions; off the court it was heroic.

Washington State's legendary Coach and Athletic Director J. Fred "Doc" Bohler was entering his ninth season as head coach of the basketball team, and he was returning the core of his outstanding 1916 team that went 18-3 and earned a Northwest Conference Championship: Roy Bohler (captain and brother of the coach), Ed Copeland, Bob Moss, Ivan Price and Al Sorenson.

The first season of Washington State basketball was in 1901-02. The team played just two games that year, losing both to the Spokane YMCA. The 2007-08 season marks the 107th season of Washington State basketball.

During the time in between, there have been memorable seasons for the school. The aforementioned 1941 national runner-up team; Jack Friel's 1937 and 1950 Northern Division Champions; George Raveling's 1980 and '83 NCAA Tournament teams, and the 1994 NCAA Tournament team coached by Kelvin Sampson are among the most noteworthy.

As extraordinary as those seasons were, it's the 1917 team that holds a special place in Cougar annals.

It is a team that posted a 25-1 record, an accomplishment impressive on its own. It is made more amazing when the fact that the team played 18 of its games on the road, and used essentially a five-man roster for the season, is taken into consideration.

It is a team that became national champions decades after the fact, but were national heroes well before then.

It is a team that, despite time's best efforts, will never be forgotten.

## 1940-1941

### COUGARS COMPLETE 26-6 SEASON AS NCAA RUNNERS-UP

Legendary head coach Jack Friel had guided the Washington State College men's basketball teams of 1939 and 1940 to identical 23-10 records, but neither year would compare to the magical season of 1941 in which the Cougars finished 26-6 as the NCAA runners-up.

Paul Lindemann and Ray Sundquist were named All-Pacific Coast Conference in 1941. The duo joined Art McLarney (1930), Huntly Gordon (1932) and Ivar Nelson (1937) as Cougars named All-PCC under coach Friel. Gale Bishop (1943) and Larry Beck (1956-57) later joined the list while playing for Friel.

Washington State's starting lineup featured four seniors, including the 'giant' Lindemann, a 6-7, 230 center who paced the Cougars in scoring with 326 points (10.2). The Cougars used a pair of 6-2 seniors - Dale Gentry and Vern Butts - at forward, while senior Sundquist and junior Kirk Gebert held down the guard positions. Friel, who consistently used 11 players in his "rotation", also incorporated 6-2 sophomore Marv Gilberg as his "sixth man" for Butts.

"We were a pretty good shooting team," Friel said of his '41 Cougars. "We tried to break and we kept the pressure on by using a lot of players. Defense was our forte."

The Cougars dropped their first two Northern Division games to Oregon State in Corvallis before reeling off 13 straight wins, a conference record, to claim their first title since 1937. That winning streak included a four-game sweep over the University of Washington. WSC then beat the Southern Division champion Stanford "Indians" twice in Pullman for the Pacific Coast Championship and the right to advance to the Western United States Tournament in St. Louis.

Washington State dumped Creighton 48-39 in the opening round with Lindemann scoring 26 points. In the semifinal match Lindemann's 14 points led a balanced Cougar attack to a 64-53 upset of previously unbeaten and tournament favorite Arkansas. The win earned the Cougars the title as the best team in the West and propelled WSC into the NCAA championship game at Kansas City, Mo., with the East champion Wisconsin Badgers.

In the championship game, Gebert scored 21 of WSU's 34 points in a 39-34 loss to the Badgers. Gebert connected on 10-of-24 field goals in the game. Wisconsin was led by Gene England's 13 points.

## 1979-1980

### COUGARS EARN FIRST NCAA BERTH IN 39 YEARS

The 1980 Washington State University Cougars won seven of their final eight Pacific-10 games and earned their first trip to the NCAA Tournament in 39 years. WSU entered the tournament with a 22-5 regular season mark, the school's best win-loss percentage of the modern era.

WSU's stretch drive included a convincing 69-51 victory over conference champion Oregon State, then ranked fourth nationally, in front of a then record 12,327 Friel Court fans. The Cougars also defeated Pac-10 runner-up Arizona State 71-58 to finish third in the league with a 14-4 mark.

Head coach George Raveling's starting lineup consisted of five seniors. Forward Don Collins, the Pac-10's Player of the Year, led the league in scoring with a torrid 23.1 points per game, the highest scoring average since UCLA's Bill Walton (23.9) in 1972. Collins also set school single-season records for points (647), field goals (253) and steals (76). Point guard Brian Rison, who finished with 100 assists and 70 steals, joined Collins on the all-conference team. Stuart House, a 6-11 center, averaged 13.1 points, 8.4 rebounds and blocked 69 shots. Guard Terry Kelly and forward John Preston, team co-captains, were also in the lineup.

This was the first year the tournament expanded from 40 teams to 48. Also, all 12 teams in the four brackets were seeded and teams were placed in any region regardless of geographic considerations. While three other Pac-10 schools (OSU, ASU and UCLA) remained in the West Regional, Washington State, a No. 5 seed, was shipped out to the Mideast Regional at Purdue University to face Ivy League champion Pennsylvania, 16-11, in the opening round.

Nearly 12,700 fans piled into the Mackey Arena to watch WSU's first round match. After being tied at halftime 27-27, the Cougars jumped to a ten-point second-half lead 38-28. But when Collins fouled out with 3:57 to play, the Quakers took advantage and pulled away to a 62-55 win. Collins led all players with 20 points and six rebounds. The Quakers converted 20 of 27 foul shots, while WSU hit just 11 of 21.

## 1982-1983

### RAVELING, COUGARS MAKE RETURN TRIP TO NCAA TOURNAMENT

Perhaps no other Washington State basketball team kept Cougar fans on the edge of their seats like George Raveling's 1983 squad. The Cougars completed the regular season with a 22-6 record with 15 games decided by four points or less (the Cougs won 11) and advanced to the NCAA Tournament for the second time in four years.

After a 3-2 start in nonconference play Washington State won 12 straight games including a 76-64 blowout of Oregon State at Corvallis. The Cougars also enjoyed a perfect home court record (14-0) for the first and only time since J. Fred Bohler's 1917 team. In the final home contest of '83 a record 12,422 fans packed Friel Court and saw sophomore Bryan Pollard rebound Chris Winkler's missed shot and score at the buzzer to beat UCLA 70-68. But a one-point road loss to Washington in the season finale kept the Cougars from sharing the Pac-10 title with UCLA.

Not all of the hardship could be measured by wins and losses. WSU's 6-9 superman Guy Williams, who averaged 18.8 points and 8.9 rebounds per outing, mangled his knee at Oregon on a twisting dribble while trying to break the Ducks' press. He underwent surgery and was out for the season. But the injury to Williams brought the talents of seniors Steve Harriel (15.0), Craig Ehlo (12.0) and Aaron Haskins (8.8) to the forefront. "On this team I didn't have to deal with a lot of selfish egos," said Raveling. "This team had people willing to make personal sacrifices for team success."

Washington State, seeded eighth in the West Regional at Boise State, drew Big Sky champion Weber State in the first round and beat the Wildcats 62-52 behind Ehlo's 18 points. That gave WSU its 23rd victory of the year, the most wins in a season since the 1941 Cougars went 26-6. In round two 7-4 center Ralph Sampson's 15 points, 12 rebounds and four blocks led fourth-ranked Virginia, the top seed in the West, past the Cougars 54-49. WSU trailed by five at the half, 30-25, but tied the Cavaliers just one minute into the second half. Virginia gained a six-point advantage only to see WSU tie the score again at 40-40. But Virginia used a delay offense and three free throws by Othell Wilson gave the Cavaliers the lead for good. Haskins paced WSU with 14 points off the bench and Ehlo added 12.

The loss to Virginia left the Cougars with a 23-7 record overall and marked the end of an era as Raveling left Washington State to accept the head coaching position at the University of Iowa.



## 1991-1992

### SAMPSON TAKES COUGS TO NATIONAL INVITATION TOURNAMENT

The 1992 Washington State basketball team enjoyed its finest season with head coach Kelvin Sampson as the Cougars finished with a 22-11 record, a fifth-place showing in the Pac-10 Conference and their first trip to the National Invitation Tournament.

Senior guards Terrence Lewis, an All-Pac-10 performer, and Neil Derrick, runner-up in the NCAA Final Four Slam Dunk contest, became the only Cougar teammates to reach the 500-point plateau during the same season with 575 and 501 points, respectively. Ken Critton, another senior, provided WSU with a dominant big man as he grabbed 270 rebounds. As a team, the Cougars finished fourth in the nation in free throw percentage, hitting .760 from the foul line. That mark broke the 24-year-old school record and the 16-year-old Pac-10 mark. Defensively, the Cougars held ten opponents under 40 percent shooting.

The Cougars opened the year by winning the first 12 nonconference matches, their best start since Jack Friel's 1955 team. In Pac-10 play, WSU swept the Oregon schools for the first time since 1983. The home victory over Cal, 101-83, marked the first time the Cougars had scored over 100 points in a conference game since 1980. Point guard Bennie Seltzer played a prominent offensive role during WSU's stretch run as the Cougars won five of their last seven games. Seltzer hit 59.1 percent of his shots, 53.1 percent from three-point range and averaged 13 points. During the drive, the Cougars earned their first win of the year against a Top-25 program as WSU defeated No. 8 USC 82-68 at Friel Court on ABC-TV.

The Cougars registered win No. 22 as they beat the Golden Gophers of Minnesota 72-70 during a first-round NIT contest at home. WSU scored 11 of its last 13 points at the foul line. Lewis and Critton led the Cougars with 17 and 16 points, respectively. But the postseason road came to an end at "The Pit" in Albuquerque as host New Mexico edged the Cougars 79-71. WSU trailed the Lobos by eight at halftime 40-32. A 13-4 run gave WSU a 67-65 lead with 4:21 remaining, but the Lobos countered with a 14-4 run to close the contest. New Mexico's Khari Jaxon scored 15 points, grabbed 16 rebounds and blocked eight shots while Lewis scored 20 points with six three-pointers for WSU.

## 1993-1994

At the conclusion of the first practice of the 1994 season, head coach Kelvin Sampson announced to a capacity Bohler Gym crowd that Washington State's goal was to be one of the 64 teams invited to the NCAA Tournament. By season's end Sampson and the Cougars realized their dream of going to the "Big Dance".

Sampson's squad finished 20-11 overall, tied for fourth in the Pac-10 with a 10-8 mark and made its first NCAA appearance in 11 years.

No Cougars were selected to the all-conference team, but Sampson's collection of "No Names" had its own set of stars. Four players scored in double figures, including seniors Tony Harris (13.3), the team MVP, Eddie Hill (12.7), Fred Ferguson (10.2) and sophomore Mark Hendrickson (10.5). Hill broke WSU's single season (83) and career (233) records for 3-point baskets, while Ferguson set the school shooting percentage record (.660). Four different freshmen earned starting assignments and Isaac Fontaine, a Pac-10 All-Freshmen selection, led the league in 3-point percentage (.449).

WSU's nonconference schedule paid big dividends as the Cougars started 7-0, tallied wins over NCAA teams Michigan State, Marquette and Alabama and won the prestigious San Juan Shootout. But it was the final road to the NCAA Tournament that was paved with gutsy victories. The Cougars claimed come-from-behind wins in three of their last four regular season games, including a 94-82 dismantling of No. 16 Cal in the finale. That day Friel Court rocked with 11,019 fans, the largest home crowd since 1983.

The Cougars were the No. 8 seed of the East Regional in Landover, Md., and drew Boston College of the Big East Conference - the No. 9 seed. Both teams entered with identical 20-10 records and as the game unfolded, it was apparent how evenly the teams were matched. The one glaring difference between the two clubs proved to be the difference in the game as BC's 6-9, 220 senior Bill Curley scored 25 points with 10 rebounds to lead the Eagles to a 67-64 win.

WSU led by as many as 12 points in the first half and 38-28 at halftime. Curley and Co. fought to put the Eagles ahead 64-63 late in the second half. With eight ticks on the clock, Harris went to the foul line and made one of two shots to tie the game 64-64. Harris then fouled BC's Gerrod Abram, a 48 percent foul shooter, who broke the tie with a pair of free throws with five seconds left. A desperation halfcourt shot by Harris fell short with 1.2 seconds showing and a free throw by Howard Easley made the final score.

Fontaine paced the Cougars with 17 points and Harris, WSU's player of the game by CBS, finished with 13. A crowd of 18,667 was on hand at the USAir Arena - the largest to see a Cougar basketball game. Five weeks after the NCAA contest, Sampson accepted the head coaching position at the University of Oklahoma.

## 1994-1995

### COUGARS REACH NIT QUARTERFINALS IN EASTMAN'S DEBUT

Kevin Eastman's first year as Washington State's head coach was filled with plenty of surprises and success. WSU finished 18-12, defeated a school record five Associated Press Top 25 teams and reached the quarterfinals of the National Invitation Tournament.

The Cougars established themselves as the best offensive unit in school history. They led the nation in field goal percentage (.517). Immediately trailing the Cougars were UCLA (.515), North Carolina (.513) and Oklahoma State (.512) - all NCAA Final Four participants. WSU averaged 83.5 points per outing, tops all-time by a Cougar squad.

WSU's top seven scorers were comprised of two juniors (one transfer), three sophomores and two true freshmen. Sophomore Isaac Fontaine led the scoring list (18.5) and posted the fifth best single-season point total (555). Junior Mark Hendrickson, an All-Pac-10 first team pick, averaged 16.1 points, 9.0 rebounds. Eastman's first recruit, junior Shamon Antrum (13.7), walked away with the Fred Hessler Award as the newcomer of the year in the Pac-10. Donminic Ellison (11.3) set WSU's game (15) and season (192) assist records.

In the first round 94-82 win over Texas Tech, WSU posted its best field goal percentage (.667). During a nine-minute stretch in the first half, the Cougars made all eight field goal attempts and all six free throws. Fontaine paced WSU with 32 points and held Tech's leading scorer Mark Davis to two points.

Fontaine's driving basket with 30 seconds left led WSU past Illinois State 83-80 at Redbird Arena. All five starters scored in double figures led by Fontaine's 23 points.

The Cougars NIT trek came to a halt in Buffalo, N.Y., as Canisius College topped WSU 89-80 in front of 9,065 rambunctious fans at "The Aud", the largest home crowd in Canisius history. WSU cut Canisius' 11-point lead to four, 72-68, in the second half. During a WSU press, freshman Carlos Daniel was given a technical foul by the official at midcourt who thought Daniel knocked the ball out of the hands of a Canisius player trying to make the inbounds pass. Craig Wise made the two technical shots and WSU would get no closer. The Golden Griffins made just three baskets in the final eight minutes. Canisius made 27 of 30 foul shots, 22 straight in the second half.

## 1995-1996

After a disastrous January in which Washington State posted a 1-6 record, the Cougars overcame adversity, displayed their true mettle and put together an impressive season-ending drive to earn a spot in postseason play for the third straight season.

Washington State won seven of its final 10 regular season games to reach the National Invitation Tournament for the second year in a row. Once there, the Cougars defeated Gonzaga 92-73 at Pullman before falling to eventual NIT champion Nebraska 82-73 in Lincoln to finish the year 18-11 overall with a 9-9 Pac-10 record.

All five starters returned for head coach Kevin Eastman, who became the only WSU hoops coach to take the Cougars to postseason tournaments in back-to-back years. Senior Mark Hendrickson led the Pac-10 in rebounding (9.5) and was sixth in league scoring (16.1). Hendrickson became WSU's first NBA pick of the '90s, signing with Philadelphia. Junior Isaac Fontaine paced WSU in scoring (18.1) and led the Pac-10 in 3-point accuracy (.485) with the fifth best percentage in the NCAA. Senior Shamon Antrum was third in team scoring (12.6) and second to Fontaine in 3-pointers (54). Junior point guard Donminic Ellison also scored in double figures (10.8) and posted the second best assist mark by a Cougar (151).

The Cougars earned their highest preseason ranking in school history - 28th Associated Press - and were poised to crack the top 25 for the first time since 1983 when WSU's season collapsed. Hendrickson fractured his left (shooting) hand Dec. 27 vs. San Jose State and he missed WSU's next six contests (Cougars 2-4 in his absence). The Cougars rebounded to win five straight in February (including a victory at No. 24 Stanford, the only Cardinal home loss), then two more in March vs. Arizona State (103 points, WSU's second best total in a Pac-10 game) and at USC (first win at Sports Arena since 1986).

In the NIT first round with Gonzaga, the Cougars built a 19-point halftime lead by shooting 66.7 percent from the field. Hendrickson led all scorers with 24 points, including 11 straight during a 15-0 WSU run. At Nebraska, the Cougars committed a season-high 22 turnovers, shot a season-low 42.9 percent at the free throw line and had three players foul out.



## 2006-07

COUGARS SURPRISE COUNTRY WITH NCAA TOURNAMENT APPEARANCE  
IN TONY BENNETT'S FIRST SEASON

After being chosen to finish last in the Pacific-10 Conference prior to the season, the 2006-07 Washington State men's basketball team, led by first-year head coach Tony Bennett, surprised everyone, setting a school record with 26 wins, while its second-place Pac-10 finish tied for the best in school history.

For the team's success, Bennett earned numerous national and regional coach of the year awards, including the Pac-10 Coach of the Year and the *Associated Press* National Coach of the Year honors. Juniors

Derrick Low and Kyle Weaver also picked up accolades as the back-court duo were both named to the All-Pac-10 First Team, making it the first time WSU teammates had earned the honors since 1995-96. Although WSU reached the NCAA Tournament for the first time since 1994, the Cougars' season ended in heartbreaking fashion.

With Bennett taking the coaching reigns over from his father, Dick Bennett, the Cougars opened their season with seven-straight wins, finishing their best month of November in history with a 7-0 record. WSU opened the season in Bennett's home state of Wisconsin with wins over UAB, Wisconsin-Milwaukee and Radford at the John Thompson Foundation Challenge in Milwaukee. Following five-straight home wins over Texas-San Antonio, Idaho State, Boise State and Portland, the Cougs hit their first stumbling block, falling at Utah, 69-55.

Washington State bounced back following the loss, defeating then-No. 18 Gonzaga, 77-67, snapping an eight-game losing streak to the Bulldogs. Following the defeat of GU, WSU began receiving votes in the *Associated Press* and *ESPN/USA Today* Polls. Wins over Idaho, Cal State Northridge and San Diego State catapulted the Cougars into Pac-10 play with an 11-1 record.

When Pac-10 play opened, the Cougars were thrown into the fire right away as they hit the road to take on No. 1 UCLA. Despite holding UCLA to just 27.6 percent shooting in the first half, WSU suffered its second loss of the season and opened league play at 0-1.

The Cougars bounced back, winning their next four, including a 77-73 defeat of then-No. 7 Arizona in overtime to jump into the AP Poll top 25 at No. 22 and the *ESPN/USA Today* Poll at No. 23, Jan. 8. WSU's defeat of Arizona marked its highest of a ranked opponent at home since defeating No. 6 UCLA March 7, 1983. Their appearance in the polls gave the Cougars their first AP ranking since Feb. 1983 (No. 22, Jan. 8).

Junior Kyle Weaver recorded the first triple-double in WSU history with 14 points, 13 rebounds and 10 assists, but Stanford used a last-second 3-pointer to pull out the 71-68 victory in overtime, Jan. 13.

After two more home victories, the No. 20/18 Cougars (17-3, 6-2) hosted No. 7 Oregon, Jan. 27. Junior Derrick Low put up a career-high 37 points and tied the school record with nine 3-pointers, but the Ducks used overtime for the 77-74 victory.

Following its fourth loss of the season, WSU opened a five-game winning streak, beginning with a 72-66 victory over Arizona to complete its first sweep of Arizona since 1982-83. The Cougars also got revenge on Stanford with a 58-45 win over the then-No. 25 Cardinal during the

winning streak.

Washington State faltered twice more in league play as both UCLA and Oregon completed season sweeps of the Cougs. No. 13 WSU avoided two-straight losses in early March as it defeated No. 23 USC, 88-86 in double-overtime, March 3 in Pullman, following the loss to then-No. 2 UCLA.

The Cougars opened the Pac-10 Tournament as the No. 2 seed with their fifth-straight victory over Washington, a 74-64 win, to move on to take on USC the next day, March 9. WSU couldn't make it three-straight over the Trojans in 2006-07, falling, 70-61. However, with a 25-7 record and No. 11/12 rankings, the Cougars felt good about their chances in the NCAA Tournament.

WSU's first NCAA Tournament appearance in 13 years looked promising as it entered the tournament as a No. 3 seed facing 14th-seeded Oral Roberts in the first round in Sacramento, Calif. The Cougars overcame a slow start, trailing 28-26 at halftime, to go on for their first tournament win since 1983 with a 70-54 defeat of ORU, moving on to face sixth-seeded Vanderbilt in the second round, March 17.

Washington State built an early 33-25 halftime lead, but Vanderbilt never let down in the game of missed WSU opportunities. With WSU trailing by one, 60-59 with 46 seconds remaining, Weaver hit one-of-two free throws to tie the game at 60. Weaver's miss ended his streak of 22-consecutive free throws made. Regulation ended with the score tied at 60. Trailing 69-66, Low hit a clutch 3-pointer, his third of the game, to tie the game at 69. The Cougars forced a Commodore turnover on the next possession, but couldn't convert as a block by Vanderbilt's Derrick Byars forced double-overtime.

Vanderbilt took advantage of three WSU turnovers in the second overtime period as the Cougars' magical season ended with a 78-74 double-overtime loss to the Commodores in the second round of the NCAA tournament.

## SENIOR HIGHLIGHTS

- Paul Lindemann led the Cougars with 326 points (10.2 per game average) and WSU finished national runner-up to Wisconsin in 1940-41.
- Ron Bennink sank 185 free throws in 1954-55 to set the WSU single-season record.
- Ted Werner grabbed 24 rebounds against UCLA, Feb. 13, 1965 to set a then-Cougar single-game record...his performance still ranks second on WSU's single-game list.
- Stuart House connected 12-of-13 shots from the field to set a Cougar record for field goal percentage in a game (92.3) during a 69-67 win at USC, Feb. 23, 1980.
- In 1979-80, Don Collins set school single-season records with 23.1 points per game, 76 steals, 2.71 steals per game.
- Collins scored 30 or more points seven times during the 1979-80 season and helped the Cougars reach the NCAA Tournament for the first time in 39 seasons.
- Terrence Lewis totaled 1,106 minutes to set the WSU single-season record and the Cougars advanced to the 1992 NIT.
- Fred Ferguson shot 66 percent from the field to set the WSU single-season record in 1993-94 as the Cougars earned a bid to the NCAA Tournament.
- Isaac Fontaine set a WSU single-season scoring record in 1996-97 with 657 points.
- Thomas Kelati made seven 3-pointers and scored 27 points to lead WSU to a 70-63 upset win at No. 11 Arizona, Jan. 29, 2005.

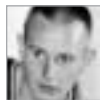

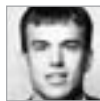

## FRESHMAN HIGHLIGHTS

- Steve Puidokas recorded three of the top scoring games in WSU freshman history, including 31 at San Diego, Jan. 29, 1974 and finished the season with a school freshman record 454 points.
- Ricky Brown started 17 games, shot 54 percent from the field and earned a spot on the Pacific-10 All-Rookie team in 1982-83.
- During the 1989-90 season, Bennie Seltzer set WSU freshman records for 3-pointers (62) and assists (114).
- Rob Corkrum posted 36 blocks and 1.3 blocks per game during the 1990-91 season to lead all Cougars in both categories and establish WSU freshman records.
- Mark Hendrickson ripped down a WSU freshman record 18 rebounds during a 94-71 win over Azusa Pacific at the Texas Star Classic in San Diego, Dec. 18, 1992.
- Isaac Fontaine set a WSU freshman record with 33 points during a 76-71 victory over Michigan State at the San Juan Shootout, Nov. 27, 1993.
- Blake Pengelly shot 49 percent from beyond the 3-point line in 1996-97 to set the WSU single-season record.
- Mike Bush's 47 steals in 1998-99 set a school freshman record and tie for 15th on the WSU single-season list.
- Marcus Moore became one of 14 players in Cougar history to reach the century mark for assists in a season when he handed out 100 in 2000-01.
- Aron Baynes tied a WSU freshman record with five blocks at San Diego State, Dec. 10, 2005 and the Cougars defeated the eventual NCAA participant Aztecs 60-49.

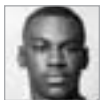

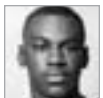
