

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Inheriting a program that won two games and was winless in the Pacific-10 Conference in 2002, Washington State Head Women's Basketball Coach Sherri Murrell has directed the program to improvements in each of her

first three years at the helm of the program.

An indication of that progression is the increased number of competitive games the team played last season. In 2004-05, WSU was involved in nine games decided by six points or fewer, more than the previous two seasons combined (eight).

The Cougars also made significant progress closing the scoring gap in games each year culminating in an average scoring margin that was in single digits in 2005.

Additionally, the defense held the opposition to below 70 points 19 times in 2005. Two years ago that number was seven and improved to 13 in 2004.

The stat sheet was not the only area where the program improved as attendance has risen in each of Murrell's first three years at WSU. From 2002 -- the year prior to Murrell's arrival at WSU -- to 2005, attendance at WSU home games increased over 86 percent.

Finally, in March of 2005, Murrell signed a contract extension that will keep her on the Palouse through the 2010 season.

Those facts demonstrate the foundation of the rebuilding process Murrell has undertaken at WSU.

But then, transforming a Division I basketball program into a winner is nothing new for Murrell, who begins her fourth

year at the helm of the Cougars.

When Murrell took over as head coach of the University of the Pacific in 1999, she inherited a team that had posted consecutive 9-18 seasons.

Murrell quickly turned matters around in her first season at Stockton, leading the Tigers to a 14-13 overall record including a 10-5 mark in Big West Conference play.

That marked the first of four consecutive winning seasons for Murrell; as the Redmond, Ore. native compiled a 68-46 overall mark at Pacific, including a 40-20 record in the conference.

Murrell begins her fourth season with the Cougars continuing her work on the task set before her - rebuild and win

The rebuilding process was something that Murrell was ready to undertake when she arrived on the Palouse in 2002.

"I love challenges," Murrell said on the day of her hiring.
"I look forward to this as an adventure. It is something that I am not shy about and I am not going to back down from."

It was a challenge Murrell was confident about taking on due to what WSU already had in place.

"When you are looking at positions, one of the most important things to look at is what is there to recruit players," Murrell said. "I saw the abundant resources here from academics, athletics, all the way to the coaches and administrators. With all these resources available, I feel like the kids who are coming in - combined with those that are here - will put this program on the map in Washington, the West Coast and the Pac-10.

"Those things are in place," Murrell continued. "That's probably the most important consideration for me to look at and why I accepted the job."

University of the Pacific, 1998-2002

- Head Coach. Coached the Tiger women to a 68-46 record in four years, including a 19-11 mark in 2002; in four years her teams went 40-20 in Big West Conference play.
- In her first season team finished 10-5 in BWC play, equaling the school record for conference winning percentage.
- In her second season, 2000, her team won 18 games, the highest win total since 1996; coached the Tigers to their first appearance in the Big West Tournament semifinals since 1996.
- Recruited Selena Ho, who won BWC Freshman of the Year honors in 1999, then finished her career with back-to-back first team honors, only the third Pacific player to twice earn first team conference honors.
- Selena Ho and Gillian d'Hondt were both named to the BWC first team in 2002, the first time Pacific had two players named to the conference first team.
- Guided the Tigers to a 19-11 season in 2002, the most wins by a Pacific team since the 1995 team won 20.
- Completed her career with four consecutive winning seasons; not since 1993-96 had Pacific put together a string of four straight winning campaigns.

MARK LEWIS

ASSISTANT COACH

A coaching veteran of the Pacific-10 Conference, Mark Lewis is in his fourth season as the recruiting coordinator/assistant coach with the Washington State women's basketball team.

Lewis joined Sherri Murrell's staff in 2002 after spending a season at Western Kentucky. The 20-year coaching veteran

is no stranger to the Conference of Champions as he spent five seasons at Arizona State from 1996-2001.

Since Lewis' arrival at WSU, the Cougars inked: Kate Benz, who, in 2005, became the first player in school history to lead the Pac-10 in rebounding; Adriane Ferguson, the first player from the Greater Spokane League to choose WSU since 1985; Ebonee Coates, who was named as one of the Top 100 seniors by Blue Star Index in 2004.

While in Tempe, Lewis helped lead the Sun Devils on a steady climb to national prominence. The rise was capped by ASU's first-ever Pac-10 championship in 2001, and consecutive postseason

appearances, including a spot in the 2001 NCAA Tournament (ASU's first since 1992). The Sun Devils also finished 2001 ranked 25th in the nation by the Associated Press, earning their first season-ending ranking in 18 years.

Lewis is an avid reader and dog enthusiast. He is the proud owner of "Coach", a mini-lab.

After serving as an assistant on Sherri Murrell's staff at the University of the Pacific during the 2001-02 season, Fisher, who hails from Portland, Ore., made the move with Murrell

to the Palouse in the spring of 2002. The 2005-06 campaign marks the seventh season that Fisher has worked with Murrell as the duo was at Portland State from 1996 to 1998.

Among Fisher's duties are game scheduling, recruiting and website coordination, in addition to perimeter player development.

Fisher was a four-year standout at Boise State from 1990-1994. During her playing career the Broncos made an appearance in the NCAA Tournament in 1994 and were Big Sky champions in 1992 and 1994.

Fisher (formerly Workman) comes from a strong basketball

background. Her father, Tom Workman, played in the ABA for the Utah Stars, Baltimore Bullets and Denver Rockets. Fisher and her husband, Toby, who is a police officer in Moscow (Idaho), reside in Pullman with their dogs Kurbee and Rubee.
