SHERRI MURRELL



HEAD COACH

Transforming a Division
I basketball program into a
winner is nothing new for
Washington State Women's
Basketball Head Coach Sherri
Murrell.

When Murrell took over as head coach of the University of the Pacific in 1999, she inherited a team that had posted consecutive 9-18 seasons.

Murrell quickly turned matters around in her first season at Stockton, leading the Tigers to a 14-13 overall record including a 10-5 mark in Big West Conference play.

That marked the first of four consecutive winning seasons for Murrell as the Redmond, Ore. native compiled a 68-46 overall mark at Pacific, including a 40-20 record in the conference.

Murrell begins her third season with the Cougars continuing her work on the familiar task set before her - rebuild and win.

The rebuilding process was something that Murrell was ready to undertake when she arrived on the Palouse in 2002.

"I love challenges," Murrell said on the day of her hiring. "I look forward to this as an adventure. It is something that I am not shy about and I am not going to back down from."

It was a challenge Murrell was confident about taking on due to what WSU already had in place.

"When you are looking at positions, one of the most important things to look at is what is there to recruit players," Murrell said. "I saw the abundant resources here from academics, athletics, all the way to the coaches and administrators. With all these resources available, I feel like the kids who are coming in - combined with those that are here - will put this program on the map in Washington, the West Coast and the Pac-10.

"Those things are in place," Murrell continued. "That's probably the most important consideration for me to look at and why I accepted the job."

Murrell has already taken advantage of those resources in setting the foundation of rebuilding the program.

Her first recruit to WSU, Bianca McCall, earned a 2003 & 2004 All-Pacific-10 Conference women's basketball honorable mention selection. During her career, McCall recorded 37 double-digit scoring games and 10 double-doubles in points and rebounds.

Murrell's 2003 freshmen class of Kate Benz, Adriane Ferguson, Stephanie Singer and Nikki Stratton combined to play in 105 games last season including 62 starts. Benz earned a conference all-freshman team selection as she led the Cougars in rebounds (6.7/game) and was second in points (8.8/game).

Murrell departed Pacific on a high note as she capped her

string of winning seasons with a 19-11 record in 2002, the most triumphs by the program since 1995. Additionally, the four consecutive winning seasons under Murrell's watch marked the first time since 1993-96 that Pacific had put together a string of four winning campaigns.

In 2002, Murrell guided the Tigers to the Big West Tournament Championship game. During the regular season, Pacific finished in a tie for second place in the conference for the second consecutive season. In 2000, Murrell coached the Tigers to their first appearance in the pre-season WNIT as well as the Big West semifinals for the first time since 1996.

While at Pacific, Murrell coached Selena Ho, who won the BWC Freshman of the Year honors in 1999 and then finished her career with back-to-back first team honors. Ho became only the third player in Pacific history to earn first team conference honors twice.

Along with Ho, Gillian d'Hondt was also named to the BWC first team in 2002, marking the first time Pacific had two players named to the conference first team. After the 2000-01 season, Murrell guided four players to All-Big West honors, the first time since the 1994-95 season Pacific had four players on the All-Big West team.

Before coming to Pacific, Murrell served as the top assistant at Portland State from 1997-99.

Murrell previously was head coach at George Fox University in Newberg, Ore., where she compiled a 52-33 record and led her team to three playoff appearances. She was named the Cascade Conference Coach of the Year twice, in 1994 and 1995, and led the Bruins into the NAIA Top-25 for the first time in school history during the 1994-95 season.

While at George Fox, Murrell also served as graduate admissions coordinator for four years and assisted the Bruin Club for two years, identifying potential donors to the program.

Prior to becoming head coach at George Fox, Murrell spent one season as a Bruin assistant. During the 1991-92 season, she was an assistant coach at Brigham Young University, and prior to that she spent one year as an assistant at Pepperdine University.

Murrell is a 1991 graduate of Pepperdine with a degree in public relations. She played two seasons as point guard for the Waves, earning All-West Coast Conference honors in 1990. Murrell also played two years of basketball at the University of Louisiana-Lafayette.

Murrell graduated from Portland's St. Mary's Academy, where she was a member of the 1985 Oregon State 4A championship team.

In 2003, Murrell became a member of the Women's Basket-ball Coaches Association (WBCA)/Kodak All-American Team Selection Committee. Murrell serves as the representative for District 8, which encompasses the western part of the nation.

Murrell, along with the representatives from the other seven districts, selects the Kodak/WBCA All-America Team from a list of finalists determined by WBCA member coaches.

University of the Pacific, 1998-2002

MARK LEWIS

ASSISTANT COACH

A coaching veteran of the Pacific-10 Conference, Mark Lewis is in his third season as the recruiting coordinator/ assistant coach for the Washington State women's basket-ball team.

Lewis joined Sherri Murrell's staff in 2002 after spending a season at Western Kentucky. The 19-year coaching veteran

is no stranger to the Conference of Champions as he spent five seasons at Arizona State from 1996-2001.

"I am very fortunate to have Mark on our staff," Murrell said. "I have always respected Mark's ability to attract and recruit great student-athletes. His past knowledge and experience with the Pac-10 is a great benefit to this program."

During his stint at Western Kentucky, Lewis served as the recruiting coordinator for a team that reached WNIT. Blue Star Index ranked WKU's fall recruiting class 35th nationally, which included the 25th ranked player in the nation according to the publication.

While in Tempe, Lewis helped lead the Sun Devils on a steady climb to national prominence, capped by their first-ever Pac-10 championship in 2001, and consecutive postseason appearances, including a spot in the 2001 NCAA Tournament (ASU's first since 1992). The Sun Devils also finished the year ranked 25th in the nation by the Associated Press, earning their first season-ending

ranking in 18 years.

Prior to arriving at Arizona State, Lewis was an assistant coach at Cincinnati from 1991-95, coordinating all recruiting efforts for the Bearcats. Blue Star Index ranked UC's 1995 recruiting class among the nation's top 40, while its 1992 crop of newcomers featured two first-team junior college All-Americans. Players recruited during Lewis' tenure made three consecutive postseason appearances and featured one WNBA draft pick.

Lewis began his coaching career in 1985 as an assistant coach at Memphis State. While there, he served as the Tigers' recruiting coordinator and helped lead MSU to a pair of Metro Conference

championships and berths in the 1985 and 1987 NCAA Tournaments. Lewis began his career as an events assistant at Memphis.

A 1982 graduate of Southern Mississippi, Lewis earned his bachelor's degree in athletic administration and coaching. While a student at Southern Mississippi, Lewis worked two years in the athletics' business and ticket office.

Pacific Northwest native Lisa Fisher is in her third season as an assistant coach with the Washington State women's basketball program.

After serving as an assistant on Sherri Murrell's staff at the University of the Pacific during the 2001-02 season, Fisher, who hails from Portland, Ore., made the move

with Murrell to the Palouse in the spring of 2002. The 2004-05 campaign marks the sixth season that Fisher has worked with Murrell as the duo was at Portland State from 1996 to 1998.

Among Fisher's duties are game scheduling, recruiting and website coordination in addition to perimeter player development.

"Lisa is someone whom I am very familiar with," Murrell said. "She is enthusiastic, energetic and a very hard worker who has great ties to the Northwest as well. She brings to the table a lot of different resources that helps us."

Prior to coming to UOP, Fisher coached at Northeastern in Boston, Mass., where she was an assistant during the 2000-01 season.

Preceding her coaching at Northeastern, Fisher was at Portland State from 1996-2000 where she and Murrell both served as assistant coaches. During her time in the Rose City, Fisher

helped guide the Vikings to their first Big Sky Championship appearance in 1999.

Fisher also served as an assistant coach for Idaho State during the 1995-96 season. While at Pocatello, Fisher was the recruiting coordinator in charge of the team's strength and conditioning program and involved in all duties related to coaching.

Fisher was a four-year standout at Boise State from 1990-1994. During her playing career the Broncos made an appearance in the NCAA Tournament in 1994 and were Big Sky champions in 1992 and 1994. She was named to the Big Sky All-Academic Team in 1991, 1993 and 1994; a Big Sky Scholar Athlete in 1994; and received the team's Most Inspirational Player Award in each year at BSU. Fisher graduated from Boise State in 1995 with a bachelor's degree in psychology.

While at Portland's Reynolds High School, Fisher garnered Mt. Hood Conference Player of the Year honors in 1990. She was first-team all-conference twice, second-team

All-State as a senior and named Reynolds Female Athlete of the Year.

Fisher (formerly Workman) comes from a strong basketball background. Her father, Tom Workman, played in the ABA for the Utah Stars, Baltimore Bullets and Denver Rockets. Fisher and her husband, Toby, who is a deputy Sheriff in Latah County (Idaho), reside in Pullman with their dog Kurbee.



Holland transferred to Dayton from Arizona State after the 2001 season. While at ASU, Holland played for current WSU assistant coach Mark Lewis, who was an assistant at ASU from 1996-2001. As a Sun Devil, Holland was selected to the All-Pac-10 Freshman Team after the 2000 campaign.

During each of the past seven summers, Holland has worked as a counselor and coach at various basketball camps. Most recently, she served as an assistant director at the WSU camp during the past three summers.

Holland (formerly Allen) married assistant coach Christopher Holland in June 2004.
