STADIUM WAY TENNIS CENTER / REX DAVIS COURT

The Stadium Way Tennis Center is the home court of the Washington State University women's tennis team. Located in the heart of the WSU campus across the street from Martin Stadium, the facility serves as a site for intercollegiate competition as well as recreational play.

The facility consists of 16 lighted courts and serves as host to the Cougar Classic each September as well as WSU dual matches in the spring.

Center court at the Stadium Way Tennis Center is named after long-time Cougar Tennis Coach Rex Davis. It was formally dedicated Oct. 7, 1995 in a ceremony during Homecoming weekend. A Richland, Wash., native, Davis led the WSU men's program from 1967 to 1995 and the women's program from 1983 to 1991. In his 28-year tenure, Davis racked up 361 wins including a 17-4 mark in 1985.

Lisa Hart enters her second season as the Washington State head women's tennis coach. Prior to WSU, Hart spent three seasons at Virginia Tech where she guided the Hokies to a 45-36 record in three seasons including third-place finishes each year in the BIG EAST Tournament.

Last season, Hart led the Cougars to a national ranking and three wins over ranked opponents. WSU's biggest victory in 2003-04 came at No. 23 Oregon in mid-March. The Cougars also defeated Oklahoma State and San Diego State, both ranked in the top 50 nationally.

Currently, Hart is a member of the Intercollegiate Tennis Association Northwest Regional Committee and the ITA National Operating Committee.

During the 2002-03 season, Hart's Virginia Tech squad concluded the year ranked No. 69 and eighth in the East

region. The Hokies posted victories in 2002-03 over No. 27 Oregon (4-3), No. 65 Marshall (4-3), No. 66 Middle Tennessee State (4-3), No. 67 Florida Atlantic (4-3) and No. 72 Penn State (6-1). Hart was a member of the ITA East Regional committee (2001-03) and chaired the committee in 2002-03. The East Region is the largest region in the United States with over 80 schools.

Prior to Virginia Tech, Hart served as the assistant women's tennis coach at the University of Nebraska for two years. While on the Nebraska staff, she helped the Cornhuskers compile a two-year record of 36-13, including 19-5 in 2000.

Hart was a tennis standout at Nebraska, finishing her career as one of the most successful women's tennis players in school history. She recorded a 74 career singles victories winning the Big 12 Conference No. 2 singles title as a senior.

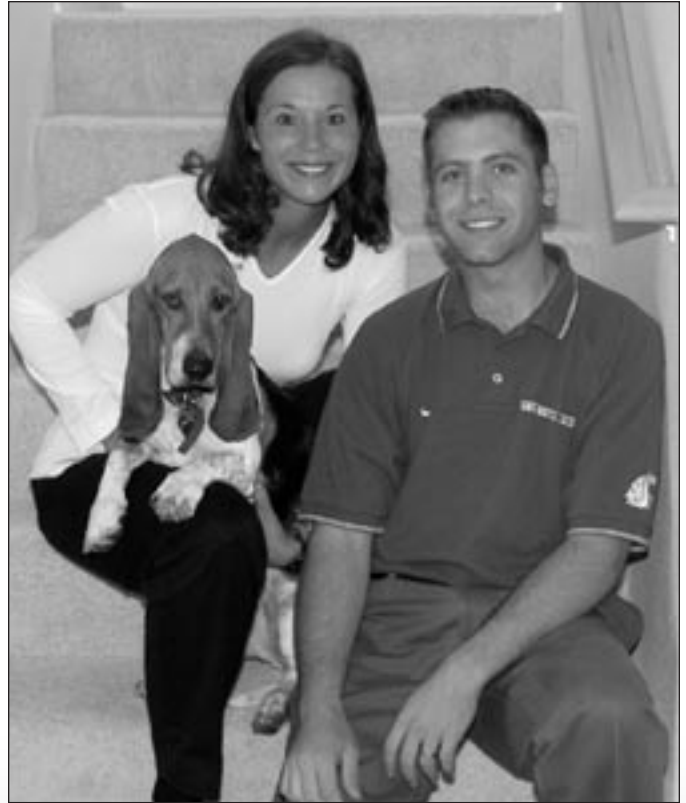
Hart, the 1995 Big Eight Freshman of the Year, was the first women's tennis player at Nebraska to win a conference singles title since 1978 and only the sixth player in Cornhuskers' history. She was selected to the all-conference team twice and her 74 wins ranks No. 3 on the school's career singles victory list.

Her dedication and excellence on the court was matched in the classroom as Hart was a three-time academic all-conference selection, earning first-team academic All-Big 12 honors as a senior. She was selected by the ITA as the Central Region's "Cissie Learie Sportsmanship Award" winner, one of six throughout the country. As a senior, Hart also received the Arthur Ashe Sportsmanship and Leadership Award.

A native of Sunnyside, Wash., Hart had an outstanding high school career at Sunnyside High where she was a three-time State champion. She also earned All-American honors as a high school sophomore.

Hart earned a bachelor's degree in elementary education from Nebraska and also holds a master's degree in education with an emphasis in coaching effectiveness and sports studies from Nebraska.

Hart and her husband John, an attorney, reside in Pullman.

Kristen (Krissy) Stubbs joins the Cougar family for her first season as the Washington State assistant women's tennis coach. Stubbs comes to WSU from Virginia Tech where she spent one year as an assistant. She helped guide the Hokies to a 14-14 record and fourth place finish in the Big East during the 2003-04 season.

Stubbs hails from Hilton Head, S.C., and earned her bachelor's and master's degrees from Virginia Tech. In July of 2003 she was hired by current Washington State Head Coach Lisa Hart as an assistant in Blacksburg and served as interim coach for a month when Hart left Virginia Tech for WSU in August of 2003.

During her collegiate playing career, Stubbs was a four-year letterwinner at Virginia Tech. Stubbs played for Hart from 2000-03. She was ranked nationally in singles during her senior season and set a school record with 81 career doubles victories.

Stubbs won several awards as a player on the court and in the classroom. Among her accolades were an Atlantic-10 all-conference selection in 2000, Atlantic-10 Rookie of the year, and Intercollegiate Tennis Association (ITA) Scholar Athlete award in 2003. In addition, she won the prestigious national ITA Arthur Ashe Leadership and Sportsmanship Award in 2003.

Stubbs is engaged to Matt Hall and they are planning to wed in the summer/fall of 2005.

2004-05 TENNIS PREVIEW

This season, the Washington State tennis team consists of three seniors, two sophomores and one freshman. The Cougars added two new faces to the program this fall in Ekaterina Burduli and assistant coach Krissy Stubbs.

Stubbs hails from Hilton Head, S.C., and earned her bachelor's and master's degrees from Virginia Tech where she played tennis for Washington State Head Coach Lisa Hart. Stubbs was a four-year letterwinner at Virginia Tech. She was ranked nationally in singles during her senior season and set a school record with 81 career doubles victories.

Burduli comes to WSU from Tel Aviv, Israel. She was ranked No. 1 in the nation of Israel from ages 10-15. In 2003 she reached the final of the Israeli Junior Championships and also earned a berth in the Israeli Championships (adult). Burduli is expected to make an immediate impact.

The three returning seniors, Nora Gaal, Chris Martinez and Orsolya Sallai, combined last year for 37 singles victories.

"I truly believe the sky is the limit for our team this year," said Washington State Head Coach Lisa Hart. Returning three experienced seniors who have seen considerable court time sets the standard for our underclassmen."

Hart added, "Our team continues to improve every day. When each player is at the top of her game, I think we can defeat anyone."

Sophomores Nelly Dvornicka and Amy Toth combined for 22 singles victories in 2003-04.

"Our on-court goals for this season are to qualify for the NCAA tournament and move up in the Pac-10 standings," said Hart. "We believe we can accomplish our goals and raise the bar for Cougar Tennis."

Washington State will face 10 opponents at home in dual matches this season including Idaho, Eastern Washington, Montana, Lewis-Clark State, USC, UCLA, Washington, Montana State, Gonzaga and Oregon.

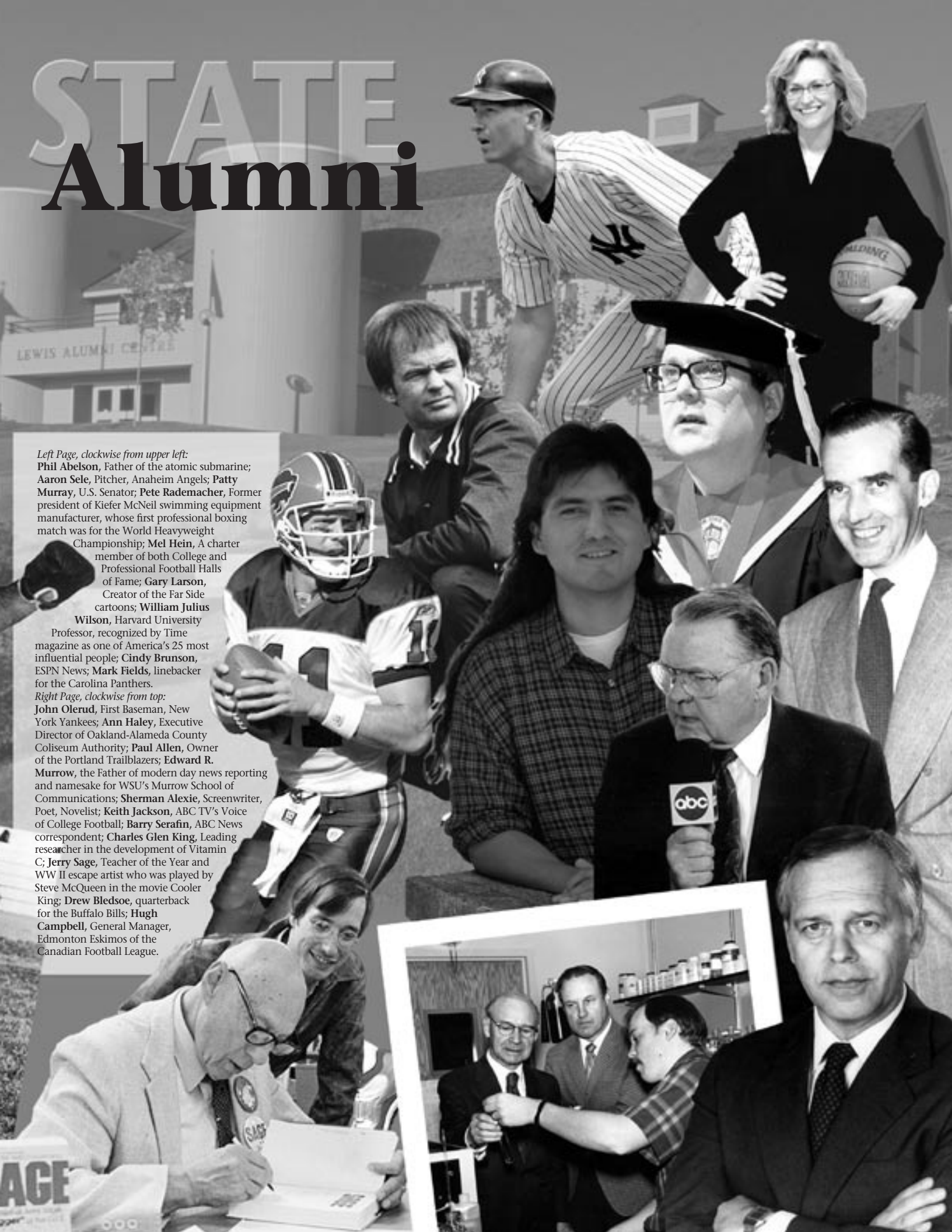

He is a nationally recognized and respected examiner for the NATABOC National Certification Examination and is currently serving as the Northwest Athletic Trainers Association District 10 Placement Committee representative for the National Athletic Trainers Association.

The Evergreen, Colo., native is the president of the Washington State Athletic Trainers Association.

Traditionally, Cougar women's athletics is a focal point of any season at Washington State University.

The 2003-04 campaign proved to be no different.

A year after making history by becoming the school's first golf All-American, **Kim Welch** added another chapter to her WSU legacy in 2003-04.

Welch led the nation with five tournament wins and garnered three national player of the week honors from two magazines. Welch also rated No. 8 in the Golfstat Cup standings from April 7-May 5, the highest any WSU golfer has been ranked. Welch concluded the season earning a first team All-American accolade and a first team All-Pac-10 selection.

Welch helped lead the Cougars to the NCAA West Regional, where they just missed earning a repeat trip to the NCAA Championships, falling short in a three-team playoff.

The rowing team also built upon the historic achievements set the previous year.

Coming off their first team berth to the NCAA Championships in 2003, the Cougars earned a second consecutive team selection to the NAAs.

The team made the most of its appearance. Propelled by a third place finish from the second varsity eight crew, the Cougars recorded a ninth place finish at the championships.

Individually, rowing was recognized on the national scale as **Erin Patterson** garnered All-America accolades from the Collegiate Rowing Coaches Association.

Bianca McCall earned a conference honorable mention selection in basketball while **Kate Benz** was named all-freshman honorable mention. The Cougars' season was highlighted by a come from behind 64-59 win at California, Jan. 29. WSU rallied from 12 points down to capture the victory. It was tied for the seventh greatest comeback in school history.

Volleyball saw **Zanda Bautre** named to the Academic All-District Third Team for District VIII as selected by the College Sports Information Directors of America (CoSIDA). Bautre was also named to the Pac-10 team.

Anna Blue earned a spot as an at-large qualifier for the NCAA National Cross Country Championships, finishing 78th. Blue was the top Cougar finisher in all six races of the season. In track, **Ana Cabrera** was named to the CoSIDA Academic All-District VIII Women's Track & Field/Cross Country All-America First Team.

In soccer, the Cougars faced one of the tougher schedules in the nation, which included a season-opening clash against No. 1 North Carolina. The team posted its first win over Stanford since 1993 with a 1-0 win over the Cardinal in the Golden State. **Nicole Wilcox** was named to the CoSIDA Academic All-District VIII University Women's Soccer First Team.

V. LANE RAWLINS

PRESIDENT



V. Lane Rawlins, a noted economist and academic leader, is the ninth president of Washington State University.

Under his leadership, WSU is recognized as one of the top 50 public research universities in the United States, according to *U.S. News & World Report*.

A strategic plan he implemented solidifies the university's commitment to undergraduate education, research and scholarship, as well as providing quality education in a caring community. The university's motto -- World Class. Face to Face. -- reflects that commitment.

His association with WSU started more than 30 years ago when he joined the Department of Economics faculty. Later, he became department chair and, for four years, he was WSU's vice provost.

He returned to WSU in 2000 after serving nine years at the president of the University of Memphis. Before that, he was academic affairs vice chancellor of the University of Alabama system.

Rawlins is the co-author of two books, has published widely, and has taught labor economics and the economics of education.

He has received many awards, including those recognizing him as a communicator, humanitarian and educator.

He earned his bachelor's degree in economics from Brigham Young University in 1963 and earned his Ph.D. in economics from the University of California, Berkeley, in 1969.

An avid fan of WSU athletics, he cheers on the Cougars at many sports events and enjoys fly fishing, golf, history and literature.

Rawlins and his wife, Mary Jo, have three children and 11 grandchildren.

MARCIA SANEHOLTZ

SENIOR ASSOCIATE ATHLETIC DIRECTOR/SWA



Marcia Saneholtz has been an integral part of Cougar athletics and instrumental in the improvement of facilities for more than two decades. She was the driving force in attaining the 1997 NCAA Division I Women's Volleyball Championships, 2001 Women's Basketball West Regional and 2003 and 2007 Men's Basketball First and Second Rounds for Washington State to host at the Spokane Arena.

From March 6 until July 1, 2000, Saneholtz served as the interim Athletic Director at WSU. Saneholtz was named a WSU Woman of Distinction in 2003.

Originally from Napoleon, Ohio, Saneholtz received her bachelor's degree from Bowling Green State University

and taught in the Los Angeles public schools for three years. She moved north, taught in the Shoreline (Wash.) public school system as a substitute and coached in the CYO and Seattle Parks Department programs. She was active in the Washington, Northwest, and national officials associations from 1973-82.

After earning her master's degree in sports administration at the University of Washington, Saneholtz was appointed the assistant women's athletic director at Washington State.

Saneholtz was promoted to associate athletic director in 1982 and currently serves as senior associate director of athletics and is the Senior Woman Administrator at WSU.

She served on the National Association of Collegiate Women's Athletic Administrators (NACWAA) Board of Directors from 1987-94, including a term as president in 1992-93. She was selected the NACWAA National Administrator of the Year in 1997.

Saneholtz has been a strong presence on several NCAA committees. She has served as the chair of the NCAA Women's Division I Volleyball Committee. Other NCAA memberships include the Committee on Athletic Certification (1993-99), chair of the Peer Selection Subcommittee (1992-99), President's Commission Liaison Committee (1992-96), and the Women's Committee on Committees (1989-92). She has also served on numerous Pacific-10 Conference committees including two terms as vice president (1988-89 and 1998-99). Currently, she is a member of the NCAA Committee on Women's Athletics.

Saneholtz and her husband, Byron, have two grown daughters, Jennifer and Amy.

JIM STERK

DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS



Washington native James M. Sterk was appointed Washington State University's director of athletics in June of 2000. In his four years, he has overseen unprecedented growth and success by the Cougars' 17 intercollegiate athletics teams and the 450 individuals who compete for WSU annually.

In the last four years, WSU has scored its best finish and highest point total in the history of the Athletic Directors Cup competition among NCAA schools.

WSU's success on the gridiron in the 21st century - three consecutive 10-win seasons - has more than done its part to draw national attention to the Cougar sports programs. In the past four years, 13 Cougar teams have been represented in postseason competition.

Facility improvements have also been among projects Sterk has tackled. WSU recently completed a major baseball field renovation and became the first collegiate program to have FieldTurf as its playing surface. An ambitious capital improvement plan is underway to enhance many other WSU sport facilities, including major changes to Martin Stadium, the home of Cougar football.

A 1979 graduate of Western Washington, Sterk received his master's degree in sports administration from Ohio University. His professional career has included positions at North Carolina, Maine, Seattle Pacific, Tulane and Portland State, the latter as director of athletics for five years before coming to Pullman.

The foundation of Sterk's leadership plan is based on five areas, the student-athlete experience, resource acquisition, personnel, political dynamics and facilities. All five areas have enjoyed growth in Sterk's arrival in Pullman.

Sterk currently is a member of the prestigious NCAA Championship/Competition cabinet and has served on numerous Pacific-10 Conference committees during his tenure at WSU.

Sterk and his wife, Debi, have three children, Ashley, Amy and Abby.

KEN CASAVANT

FACULTY ATHLETICS REPRESENTATIVE



Ken Casavant, a member of the Washington State University family since 1967, currently serves as WSU Faculty Athletics Representative to the Pacific-10 Conference and the National Collegiate Athletic Association. He is a past president of the Pac-10 and was recently chosen to serve on the NCAA Division I Management Council.

Casavant came to WSU as a graduate research assistant in the Department of Agricultural and Resource Economics. He was named an assistant professor in 1971, an associate professor in 1975 and a full professor in 1980.

In 2004, Casavant received the honor of giving the Distinguished Faculty Address, the University's oldest award and also received the Sahlin Excellence in Public Service award for the University. In 1979, Casavant received the R.M. Wade award for outstanding teacher in the college of agriculture at WSU, and in 1990, he earned the distinguished WSU Faculty of the Year award. Casavant was elected vice-chair (1991-92) and chair (1992-93) of the WSU Faculty Senate and has been accorded the Distinguished Teacher award by the American Agricultural Economics Association. He was named Distinguished Scholar by the Western Agricultural Economics Association in 2003 for his nationally recognized work as a transportation economist.

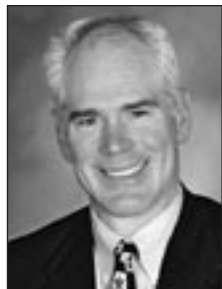

Drake enters his first year as the head coach for Cougar cross country and his third season as the director of distance runners. He helped guide Anna Blue to All-America status in the 5,000 meters at the 2003 NCAA Outdoor Track & Field Championships.

SWIMMING



Erica Quam, 3rd Year

Quam guided the Cougars to six top 15 finishes at the 2004 Pacific-10 Championships. WSU led the nation in academics with a 3.66 cumulative team grade point average.

Dick Bennett, 2nd Year

Bennett spearheaded the Cougars' six-win improvement during his first season on the Palouse. WSU led the Pacific-10 in scoring defense and qualified for Pac-10 Tournament.

Murrell is in her third year at the helm of the Cougar women's basketball program. Prior to her appointment on the Palouse, Murrell led Pacific to four consecutive winning seasons with 68 wins in that span.

In the first six years under Williams' guidance, Cougar teams re-wrote the record book and made a first-ever team appearance in the NCAA Championship (men and women). Williams helped guide Kim Welch to a fifth-place finish at the 2003 NCAA Championship.

Hart led the Cougars to a national ranking in her first season leading the program. Washington State defeated three ranked opponents, including No. 23 Oregon in Eugene.

Marbut becomes the 14th head coach in the 109-year history of Cougar baseball. A successful community college coach at Bellevue and Edmonds, the Portland State University graduate takes the helm of the program after spending a year as an assistant at WSU.

In just two years at the helm of the program, LaRiviere has made an instant impact on Cougar rowing, guiding the team to consecutive NCAA Championship appearances. In 2004, the Cougars finished ninth at the NCAAs, the best finish in program history.

Sloan has coached Cougars for 31 years and has been named the USTCA West Region Coach of the Year five times. During his head coaching tenure, All-America honors have come to WSU 47 times in men's events and 27 times in women's events.

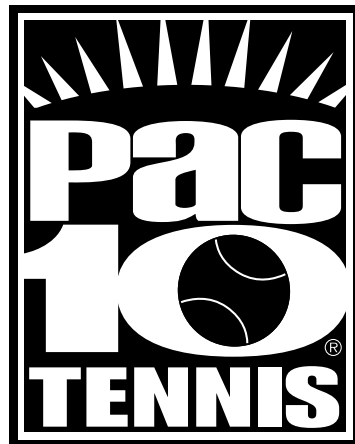

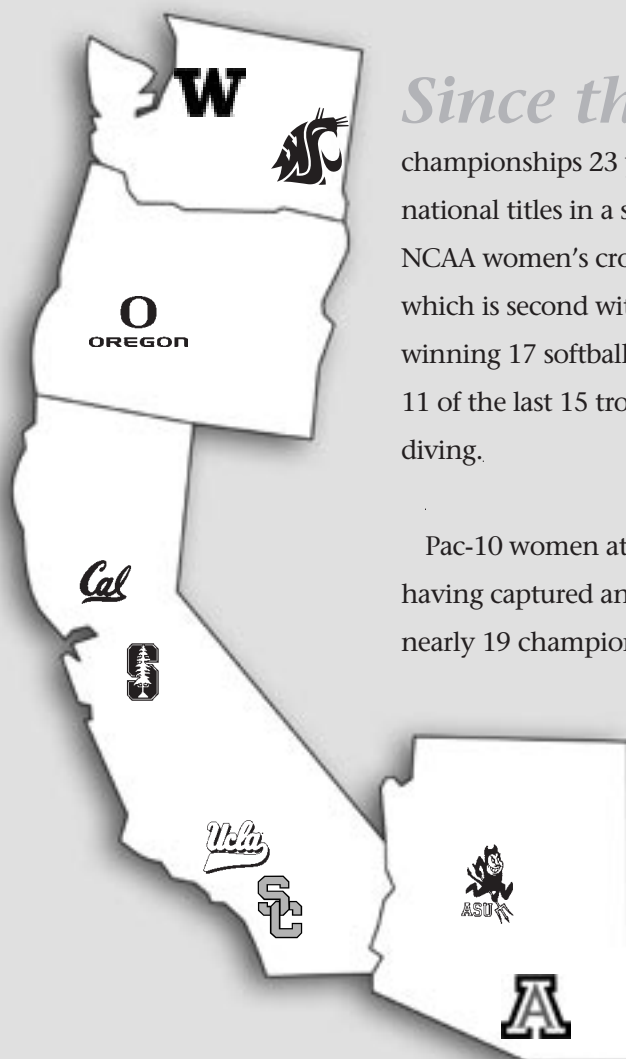
Entering the 2004-05 season, the Pacific-10 Conference continues to uphold its tradition as the "Conference of Champions."® Pac-10 members have claimed an incredible 84 NCAA team titles over the past nine seasons, for an average of more than eight championships per academic year.

Even more impressive is the breadth of the Pac-10's success, as those 84 team titles over the past nine seasons have come in 21 different men's and women's sports. The Pac-10 has now led the nation in NCAA Championships 39 of the last 44 years and finished second five times.

Spanning nearly a century of outstanding athletics achievement, the Pac-10 has captured 336 NCAA titles (246 men's, 90 women's), far outdistancing the runner-up Big Ten Conference's 197 titles.

Since the NCAA began conducting women's championships 23 years ago, Pac-10 members have claimed at least four national titles in a single season 15 times. Overall, the Pac-10 has captured 90 NCAA women's crowns, easily outdistancing the Southeastern Conference, which is second with 60. Pac-10 members have dominated a number of sports, winning 17 softball titles, 15 tennis crowns, nine of the last 14 volleyball titles, 11 of the last 15 trophies in golf and eight of the last 16 in swimming and diving.

Pac-10 women athletes shine nationally on an individual basis as well, having captured an unmatched 428 NCAA individual titles, an average of nearly 19 champions per season.

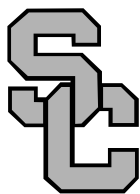

2003-04 REVIEW

The Washington State Cougars started off their season ranked No. 51 in the country. The Cougars' first win came in their second dual match against Radford where they swept singles and doubles play to take the match 7-0.

Washington State faced 20 opponents in dual matches, 18 of which were nationally ranked and five of those in the top 10. All together the Cougars faced ranked individuals 31 times and ranked doubles teams 15 times in the course of their season.

After losing 4-3 to Oregon at home February 20, Washington State faced the Ducks again almost a month later in Eugene, March 13. Despite losing all three of the doubles matches, four Cougars knocked off their foes in three set singles matches to seal the win. The Cougars win marked the opening of Pacific-10 play and it was the only conference win they captured proving the Pac-10 is the toughest conference in the nation.

"Our win over the University of Oregon halfway through our season was a great victory for our program and it was a tremendous confidence builder for our players," said Washington State Head Coach Lisa Hart.

The four nonconference wins the Cougars nabbed were against Radford, Oklahoma State, San Diego State and Hawaii.

"I was exceptionally pleased with the way our team came together last spring and displayed tremendous fight and courage on the court," said Hart.

The Cougars graduated two seniors in Lorena Arias and Zorana Roganovic. Arias played primarily at the number two position in singles earning a team-high 21 victories on the season and 71 career victories placing her fifth on the WSU all-time career victory list. She paired with Chris Martinez to capture a team-high eight doubles wins. The duo posted 46 victories in their time together tying them for the No. 1 spot on the Cougar career doubles victories list. The record-tying victory came at the Pac-10 Championships, the last competition of the season for the Cougars. Roganovic ended her WSU career with 47 victories.

"We are going to miss Lorena and Zorana. They both supplied tremendous leadership and positivity on and off the court," said Hart.

Individually several Cougars recorded exceptional seasons. Nora Gaal posted 17 wins, including an upset of California's No. 26 Sasha Podkolzina. Zsafia Fodor collected 16 wins, and was undefeated in her six February matches. Chris Martinez added 13 victories beginning the season undefeated until her seventh match.

The team finished the season with 112 singles match triumphs and came out on top in 43 doubles matches.
