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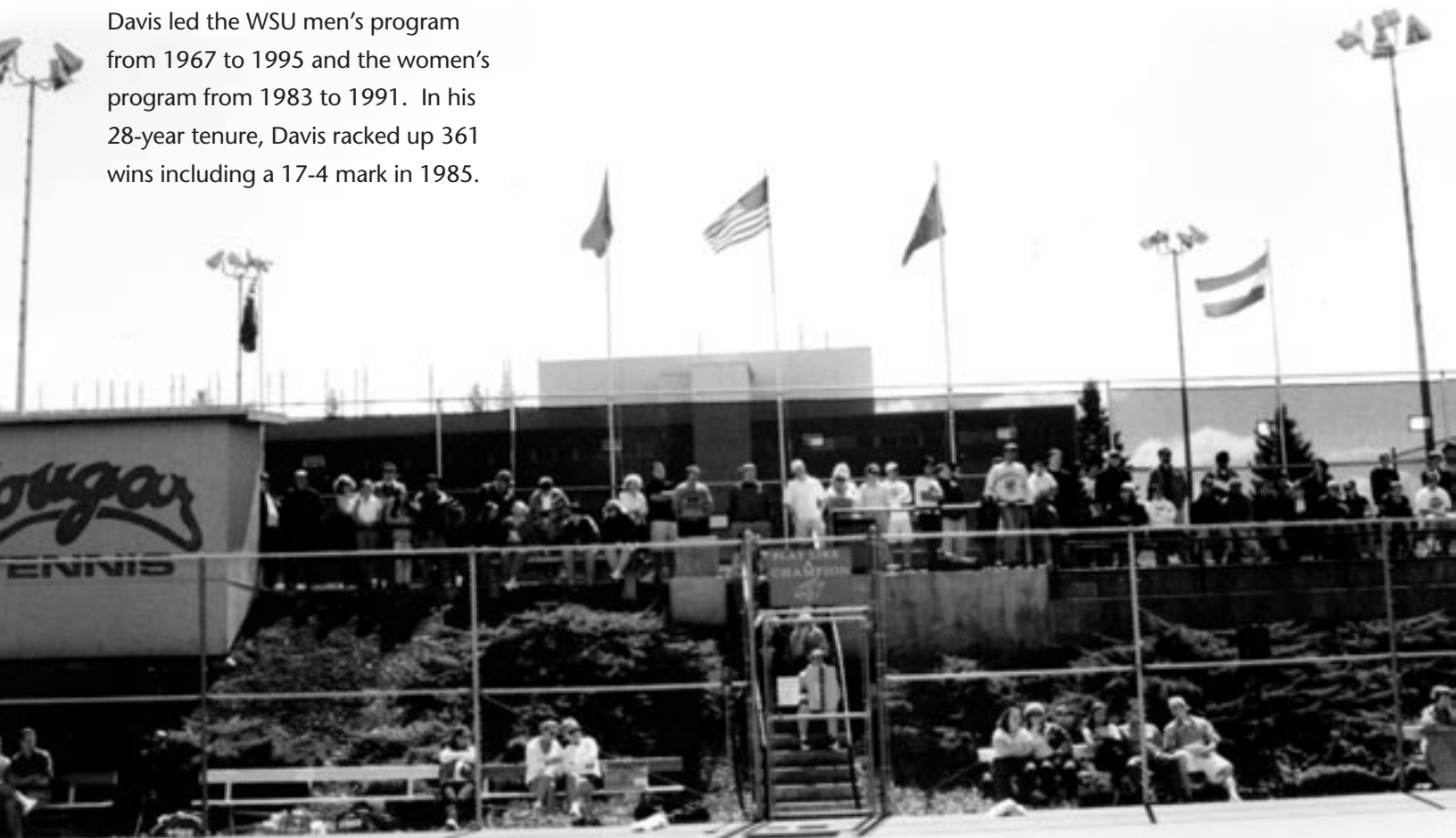
Tennis Facilities

STADIUM WAY TENNIS CENTER / REX DAVIS COURT

The Stadium Way Tennis Center is the home court of the Washington State University women's tennis team. Located in the heart of the WSU campus across the street from Martin Stadium, the facility serves as a site for intercollegiate competition as well as recreational play.

The facility consists of 16 lighted courts and serves as host to the Cougar Classic each September as well as WSU dual matches in the spring.

Center court at the Stadium Way Tennis Center is named after long-time Cougar Tennis Coach Rex Davis. It was formally dedicated Oct. 7, 1995 in a ceremony during Homecoming weekend. A Richland, Wash., native, Davis led the WSU men's program from 1967 to 1995 and the women's program from 1983 to 1991. In his 28-year tenure, Davis racked up 361 wins including a 17-4 mark in 1985.

Lisa Hart

Head Coach
Third Year

Lisa Hart enters her third season as the Washington State head women's tennis coach.

Last season, Hart led the Cougars to a national ranking that included two major wins over San Diego and Santa Clara, both nationally-ranked. The team ended with a 9-14 record and had other notable wins against Cal State Northridge, Montana, and Idaho. The Cougars took three nationally-ranked teams to the wire, losing 4-3 to No. 25 BYU, No. 73 Colorado, and No. 44 Iowa.

During the 2003-04 season, Hart led the Cougars to a national ranking and three wins over ranked opponents. WSU's biggest victory came at No. 23 Oregon in mid-March. The Cougars also defeated Oklahoma State and San Diego State, both ranked in the top 50 nationally.

Prior to WSU, Hart spent three seasons at Virginia Tech where she guided the Hokies to a 45-36 record in three seasons including third-place finishes each year in the BIG EAST Conference.

During the 2002-03 season, Hart's Virginia Tech squad concluded the year nationally ranked 69th and eighth in the East region. The Hokies posted victories over No. 27 Oregon, No. 65 Marshall, No. 66 Middle Tennessee State, No. 67 Florida Atlantic and No. 72 Penn State. Hart was a member of the International Tennis Association

(ITA) East Region committee in 2001-02 and 2002-03 and chaired the committee in 2002-03. The East Region is the largest region in the United States with over 80 schools.

Currently, Hart is a member of the ITA Northwest Regional Committee and the ITA National Operating Committee for the Northwest Region.

Prior to Virginia Tech, Hart served as the assistant women's tennis coach at the University of Nebraska for two years. While on the Nebraska staff, she helped the Cornhuskers compile a two-year record of 36-13, including 19-5 in 2000.

Hart was a tennis standout at Nebraska, finishing her career as one of the most successful women's tennis players in school history. She recorded a 74 career singles victories winning the Big 12 Conference No. 2 singles title as a senior.

Hart, the 1995 Big Eight Freshman of the Year, was the first women's tennis player at Nebraska to win a conference singles title since 1978 and only the sixth player in Cornhuskers' history. She was selected to the all-conference team twice and upon graduation her 74 wins ranked No. 3 on the school's career singles victory list.

Her dedication and excellence on the court was matched in the classroom as Hart was a three-time academic all-conference selection, earning first-team academic All-Big 12 honors as a senior. She was selected by the Intercollegiate Tennis Association as the Central Region's "Cissie Learie Sportsmanship Award" winner, one of six throughout the country. As a senior, Hart also received the Arthur Ashe Sportsmanship and Leadership Award.

During Hart's tenure with the Cougars she has been dedicated to community outreach. She was selected as the winner of the 2004 – 2005 Community Service Award by the United States Tennis Association and Intercollegiate Tennis Association. The award is to honor ITA coaches for their significant contributions in developing community based tennis programs through the community.

A native of Sunnyside, Wash., Hart had an outstanding high school career at Sunnyside High where she was a three-time State champion. She also earned All-American honors as a high school sophomore.

Hart earned a bachelor's degree in elementary education from Nebraska and also holds a master's degree in education with an emphasis in physical education and sports studies from Nebraska.

Hart and her husband John, an attorney, reside in Pullman.

Assistant Coach First Year

Elissa Kinard enters her first season as assistant tennis coach at Washington State. Prior to arriving in Pullman, Kinard most recently served as the assistant men's and women's tennis coach at Colgate University. Included in her responsibilities were assisting in the daily operations of the tennis teams, apparel and equipment management, as well as off campus recruiting for the women's team.

Kinard spent the 2004-05 season as the assistant coach at American University.

Kinard began her collegiate playing career at the University of Nebraska in the fall 2000. She enjoyed a successful freshman year, posting a 16-5 record and finishing as the Big 12 runner-up in singles. Following her sophomore year, Kinard transferred to Virginia Tech. There she earned Rookie of the Year honors in her junior year, while playing for then head coach Lisa Hart. She also enjoyed a standout doubles career, being ranked as high as No. 2 in the Eastern Region, and No. 31 in the nation.

Kinard attended Bishop England High School in Charleston, S.C. There she was four time South Carolina State Player of the Year, South Carolina State Champion, All-State, and Lowcountry Player of the Year. She was also the only female candidate for the High School Heisman from her school.

Kinard, a native of Charleston, S.C., earned her bachelor's degree in sociology from Virginia Tech, and also holds a master's degree in health promotions from Virginia Tech.

FALL REVIEW/SPRING PREVIEW

The Washington State women's tennis team is back in action this spring with a young squad possessing lofty goals, first and foremost of which is qualifying for the NCAA Tournament, something the Cougars have not done since the 2002 season.

The Cougars' spring schedule features nationally-ranked nonconference opponents along with the Pacific-10 Conference opposition, which head coach Lisa Hart views as one of the premier conferences in the nation.

"We're looking forward to our Pac-10 schedule," Hart said. "We will have many opportunities to compete with the best teams in the country."

WSU returns four letterwinners (three sophomores and one junior) and welcomes seven new student-athletes to the 2006 team. The newcomers include Aleksandra Cekic, Ashley Flynn, Tessa Hollyn Taub, Anastesia Opata, Maria Ring, Bianca Selaru, and Marjolein van de Ven.

The Cougars are led by team captain Ekaterina Burduli and will lean on her for leadership. Along with Burduli, junior Amy Toth is expected to help the Cougar squad become a

force to be reckoned with in the Pac-10. The Cougars also return Kara Konomos and Aleksandra Stefanova.

"(Ekaterina) Burduli and (Amy) Toth have been outstanding leaders this year on and off the court," Hart said.

The Cougars enter the spring season with two players nationally-ranked by the Intercollegiate Tennis Association. Burduli, a sophomore, is ranked No. 59 after a fall season in which she took home first place at the Cougar Classic and second at the Maryland Invitational. Junior transfer van de Ven is ranked No. 81 and also had a strong fall season. She reached the final at the Cougar Classic in flight C, and qualified for the semifinal at the Maryland Invitational.

Despite their youth, the newcomers accumulated 34 wins in the fall as the freshman combination of Ring and Cekic tallied 13 of those wins.

Toth leads the Cougar returnees with two varsity letters and a fall record of 8-3. She reached the final in flight C at the Maryland Invitational last September.

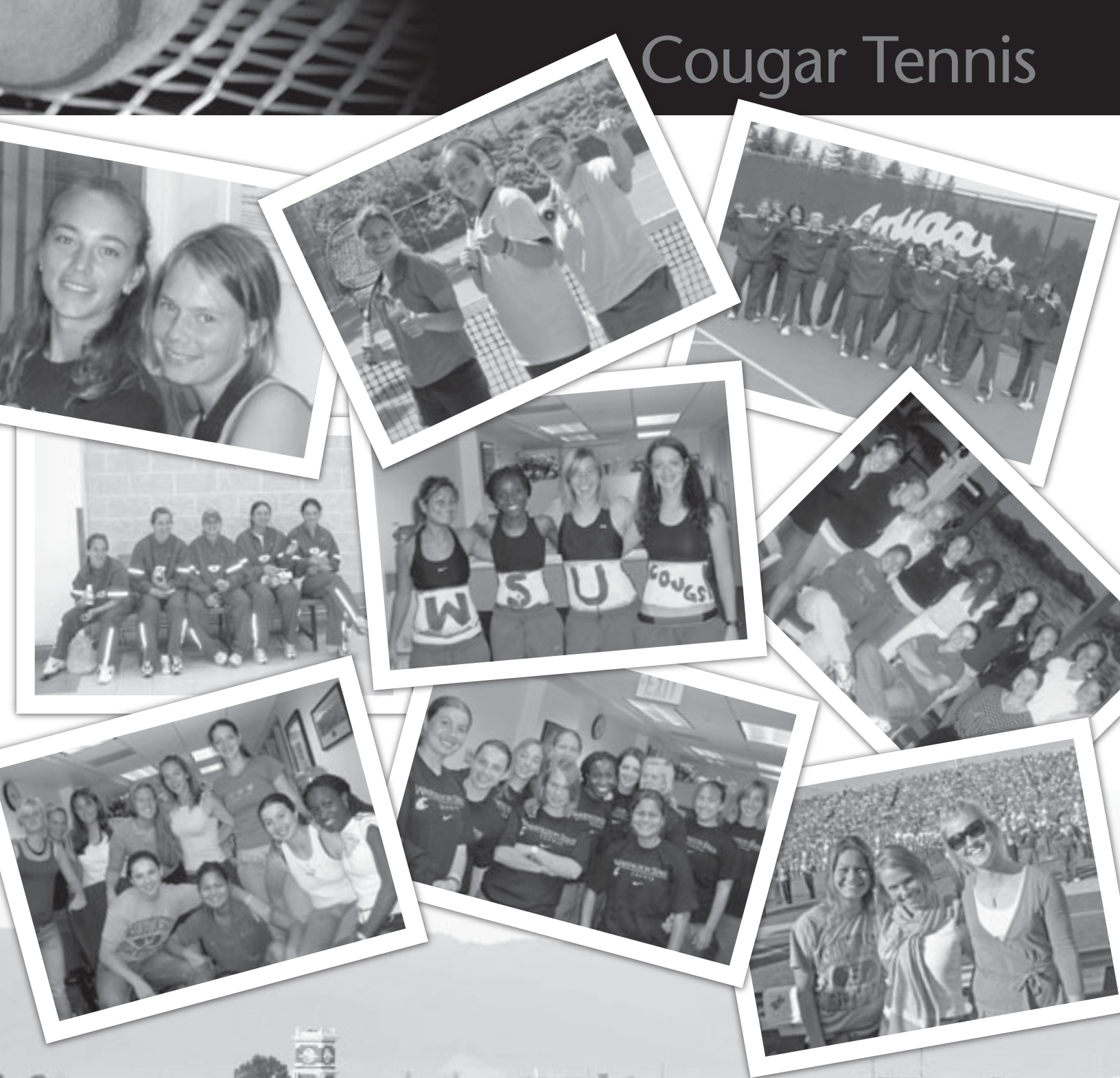

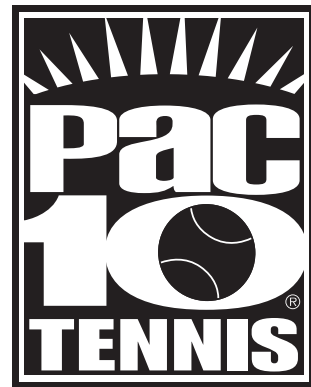

Entering the 2005-06 season, the Pacific-10 Conference continues to uphold its tradition as the "Conference of Champions."® Pac-10 members have claimed an incredible 90 NCAA team titles over the past 11 seasons, for an average of more than eight championships per academic year.

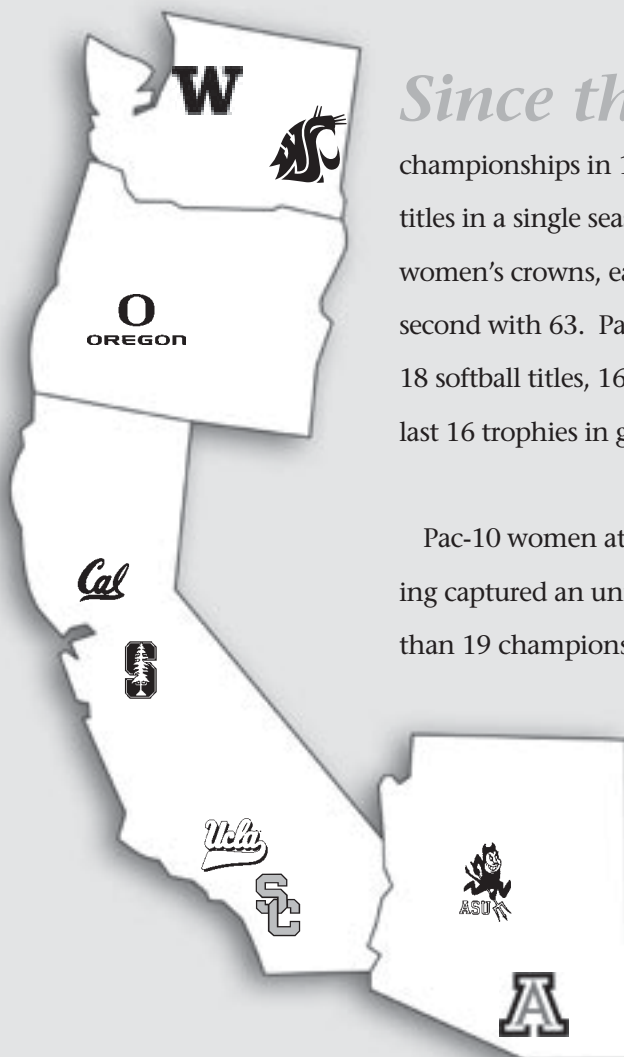
Even more impressive is the breadth of the Pac-10's success, as those 90 team titles have come in 21 different men's and women's sports. The Pac-10 has led the nation in NCAA Championships 39 of the last 45 years and finished second five times.

Spanning nearly a century of outstanding athletics achievement, the Pac-10 has captured 342 NCAA titles (248 men's, 94 women's), far outdistancing the runner-up Big Ten Conference's 201 titles.

Since the NCAA began conducting women's championships in 1981-82, Pac-10 members have claimed at least four national titles in a single season 16 times. Overall, the Pac-10 has captured 94 NCAA women's crowns, easily outdistancing the Southeastern Conference, which is second with 63. Pac-10 members have dominated a number of sports, winning 18 softball titles, 16 tennis crowns, 10 of the last 15 volleyball titles, 11 of the last 16 trophies in golf and eight in swimming and diving.

Pac-10 women athletes shine nationally on an individual basis as well, having captured an unmatched 439 NCAA individual titles, an average of more than 19 champions per season.

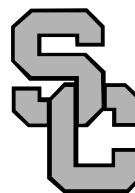

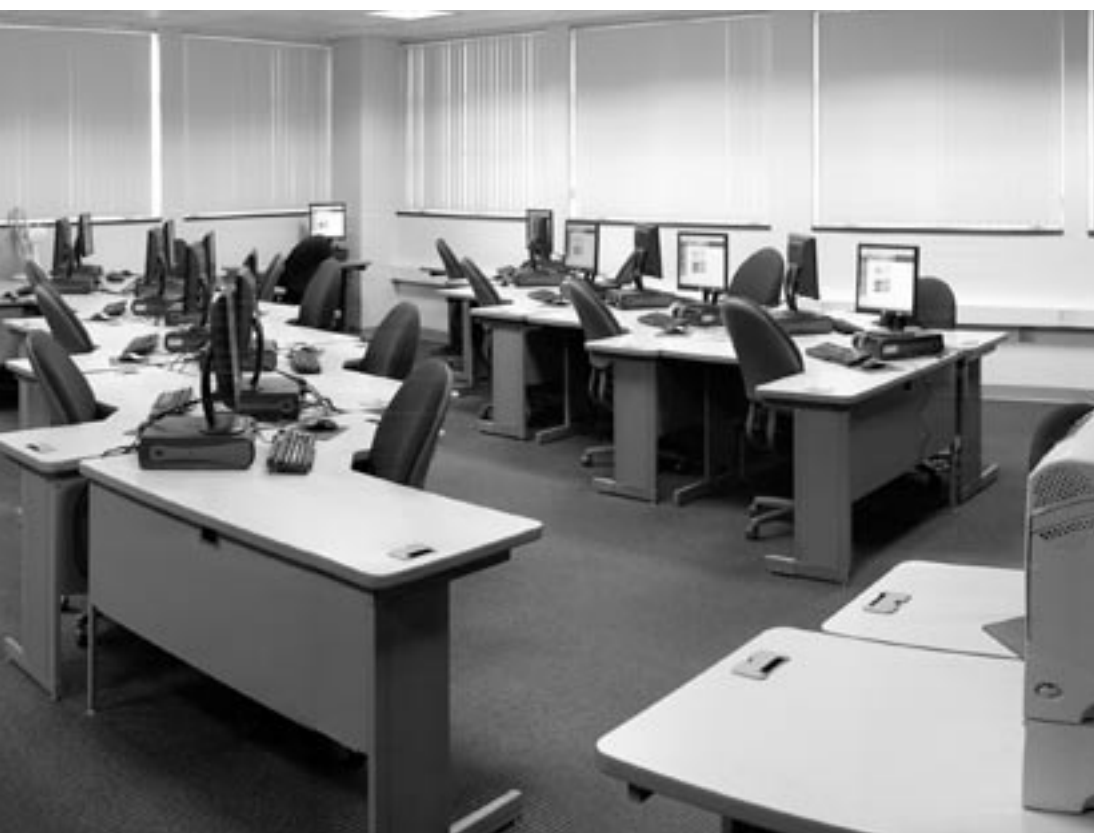


STUDENT-ATHLETE DEVELOPMENT

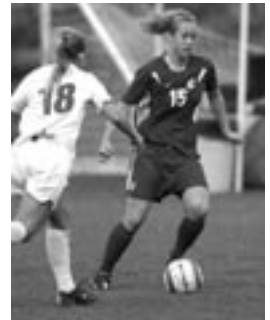

PRESIDENT



V. Lane Rawlins, a noted economist and academic leader, is the ninth president of Washington State University.

Under his leadership, WSU is recognized as one of the top 50 public research universities in the United States, according to *U.S. News & World Report*.

A strategic plan he implemented solidifies the university's commitment to undergraduate education, research and scholarship, as well as providing quality education in a caring community. The university's motto -- World Class. Face to Face. -- reflects that commitment.

His association with WSU started more than 30 years ago when he joined the Department of Economics faculty. Later, he became department chair and, for four years, he was WSU's vice provost.

He returned to WSU in 2000 after serving nine years at the president of the University of Memphis. Before that, he was academic affairs vice chancellor of the University of Alabama system.

Rawlins is the co-author of two books, has published widely, and has taught labor economics and the economics of education.

He has received many awards, including those recognizing him as a communicator, humanitarian and educator.

He earned his bachelor's degree in economics from Brigham Young University in 1963 and earned his Ph.D. in economics from the University of California, Berkeley, in 1969.

An avid fan of WSU athletics, he cheers on the Cougars at many sports events and enjoys fly fishing, golf, history and literature.

Rawlins and his wife, Mary Jo, have three children and 11 grandchildren.

MARCIA SANEHOLTZ

SENIOR ASSOCIATE DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS/SWA



Marcia Saneholtz has been an integral part of Cougar athletics for more than two decades, has been instrumental in the improvement of facilities since her appointment in 1982. She was the driving force in attaining the 1997 NCAA Division I Women's Volleyball Championships, 2001 Women's Basketball West Regional and 2003 and 2007 Men's Basketball First and Second Rounds for Washington State to host at the Spokane Arena.

From March 6 until July 1, 2000, Saneholtz served as the interim Athletic Director at WSU. Saneholtz was named a WSU Woman of Distinction in 2003.

Originally from Napoleon, Ohio, Saneholtz received her bachelor's degree from Bowling Green State University and taught in the Los Angeles public schools for three years. She moved north, taught in the Shoreline (Wash.) public school system as a substitute and coached in the CYO and Seattle Parks Department programs. She was active in the Washington, Northwest, and national officials associations from 1973-82.

After earning her master's degree in sports administration at the University of Washington, Saneholtz was appointed the assistant women's athletic director at Washington State.

Saneholtz was promoted to associate athletic director in 1982 and currently serves as senior associate directors of athletics and is the Senior Woman Administrator at WSU.

She served on the National Association of Collegiate Women's Athletic Administrators (NACWAA) Board of Directors from 1987-94, including a term as president in 1992-93. She was selected the NACWAA National Administrator of the Year in 1997.

Saneholtz has been a strong presence on several NCAA committees. She has served as the chair of the NCAA Women's Division I Volleyball Committee. Other NCAA memberships include the Committee on Athletic Certification (1993-99), chair of the Peer Selection Subcommittee (1992-99), President's Commission Liaison Committee (1992-96), and the Women's Committee on Committees (1989-92). She has also served on numerous Pacific-10 Conference committees including two terms as vice president (1988-89 and 1998-99). Currently, she is a member of the NCAA Committee on Women's Athletics.

Saneholtz and her husband, Byron, have two grown daughters, Jennifer and Amy.

JIM STERK

DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS



Washington native James M. Sterk was appointed Washington State University's director of athletics in June of 2000. In his four years, he has overseen unprecedented growth and success by the Cougars' 17 intercollegiate athletics teams and the 450 individuals who compete for WSU annually.

In the last five years, WSU has scored its best finish and highest point total in the history of the Athletic Directors Cup competition among NCAA schools.

WSU's success on the gridiron in the 21st century - three consecutive 10-win seasons - has more than done its part to draw national attention to the Cougar sports programs. In the past four years, 13 Cougar teams have

been represented in postseason competition.

Facility improvements have also been among projects Sterk has tackled. WSU recently completed a major baseball field renovation and became the first collegiate program to have FieldTurf as its playing surface. An ambitious capital improvement plan is underway to enhance many other WSU sport facilities, including major changes to Martin Stadium, the home of Cougar football.

A 1979 graduate of Western Washington, Sterk received his master's degree in sports administration from Ohio University. His professional career has included positions at North Carolina, Maine, Seattle Pacific, Tulane and Portland State, the latter as director of athletics for five years before coming to Pullman.

The foundation of Sterk's leadership plan is based on five areas, the student-athlete experience, resource acquisition, personnel, political dynamics and facilities. All five areas have enjoyed growth in Sterk's arrival in Pullman.

Sterk currently is a member of the prestigious NCAA Championship/Competition cabinet and has served on numerous Pacific-10 Conference committees during his tenure at WSU.

Sterk and his wife, Debi, have three children, Ashley, Amy and Abby.

KEN CASAVANT

FACULTY ATHLETICS REPRESENTATIVE



Ken Casavant, a member of the Washington State University family since 1967, currently serves as WSU Faculty Athletics Representative to the Pacific-10 Conference and the National Collegiate Athletic Association. He is a past president of the Pac-10 and was recently chosen to serve on the NCAA Division I Management Council.

Casavant came to WSU as a graduate research assistant in the Department of Agricultural and Resource Economics. He was named an assistant professor in 1971, an associate professor in 1975 and a full professor in 1980.

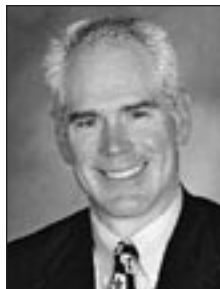

FOOTBALL



Bill Doba, 3rd Year

Bill Doba's 2004 Cougars notched an Apple Cup victory and posted wins over bowl bound teams New Mexico and UCLA. Doba became just the fourth Pac-10 coach to win 10 or more games in his first season in 2003 as he led the Cougars to a second place finish in the Pac-10 and a victory over Texas in the Holiday Bowl. The 2005 campaign will mark his 17th season with the program, helping WSU reach six bowl games, including a pair of Rose Bowls.

VOLLEYBALL



Brian Heffernan, 2nd Year

Heffernan enters his second season at WSU after serving two years as an associate head coach and two years as an assistant coach at the University of Minnesota where he helped guide the Golden Gophers to four NCAA appearances including a national semifinal match in 2003, and the Big Ten Conference title that same season.

SOCCER



Matt Potter, 3rd Year

Potter enters his third season on the Palouse after a 2004 campaign that saw the Cougars upset four ranked opponents, including wins over Pac-10 rivals No. 8 UCLA, No. 22 USC and No. 12 Washington. Potter, a native of England, spent eight years with the Sereno Soccer Club in Arizona prior to coming to Washington State. He was also a member of the Watford Football Club and represented England internationally as a player.

CROSS COUNTRY



Jason Drake, 2nd Year

Drake enters his second year as the head coach and fourth year of coaching the men's and women's cross country programs. The 2004 Cougar women's team finished an unexpected fifth at the 2004 Pac-10 Championships and strong recruiting classes the past two years give both programs optimism for the future.

SWIMMING



Erica Quam, 4th Year

During Quam's tenure, WSU swimmers have set two school records, earned 61 spots on the Cougars' all-time top 10 lists and recorded a 41st place finish at the NCAA championships. The team has been in the top four nationally all six semesters academically.

MEN'S BASKETBALL



Dick Bennett, 3rd Year

The Cougars have led the Pac-10 in scoring defense each of the last two seasons. WSU's 25 overall and 14 conference wins are the most in a two-year span since the 1996-97 seasons.

WOMEN'S BASKETBALL



Sherri Murrell, 4th Year

Murrell is in her fourth year at the helm of the Cougar women's basketball program. In 2005, Murrell's recruit Kate Benz became the first player in program history to lead the Pac-10 in rebounding. Walt Williams, 8th Year

In the first seven years under Williams' guidance, Cougar teams re-wrote the record book and made a first-ever team appearance in the NCAA Championship (men and women). Williams has coached two All-Americans (Kim Welch, Anastasia Kostina) and in 2003 Welch earned a fifth-place finish at the NCAA Championship.

TENNIS



Lisa Hart, 3rd Year

The Cougars have been ranked nationally each of the last two seasons. WSU has five wins over ranked opponents during Hart's tenure.

BASEBALL



Don Marbut, 2nd Year

Marbut became the 14th head coach in the 110-year history of Cougar baseball as he took the reins in 2004 after spending a year as an assistant at WSU. A successful coach at the community college level, the Portland State University graduate coached Washington State to 21 wins and saw three players drafted in his initial campaign.

ROWING



Jane LaRiviere, 4th Year

In just three years at the helm of the program, LaRiviere has made an instant impact on Cougar rowing, guiding the team to consecutive NCAA Championship appearances. In 2004, the Cougars finished ninth at the NCAAAs, the best finish in program history.

TRACK & FIELD



Rick Sloan, 12th Year

Sloan has coached Cougars for 32 years and has been named the USTCA West Region Coach of the Year five times. During his head coaching tenure, All-America honors have come to WSU 48 times in men's events and 31 times in women's events.
