Indoor/Outdoor WSU Tennis Facilities

Washington State University tennis facilities have seen some major upswing over the past two years with the addition of a new outdoor tennis center and the renovation of the Cougars' indoor facilities.


In the spring of 2007, a new outdoor tennis center was completed and serves as the outdoor home of Cougar tennis. The facility is named the WSU Outdoor Tennis Center and hosted its first matches during the fall of 2007.

The state-of-the-art facility features 12 lighted courts, an adjacent clubhouse, PlexiPave tennis surface, and improved spectator viewing areas.

The indoor tennis facility in Hollingbery Fieldhouse received a renovation in the fall of 2006. The facility has served a variety of purposes for WSU Athletics over the years as the indoor training facility for tennis, track and field, rowing, and baseball, now the women's tennis team is the primary resident of the facility.

During the renovation the number of courts was decreased from five to four which allows for the maximum amount area between courts. An upgraded lighting system allows for multiple light levels depending upon scheduled events. The system is on a sensor that allows the lights to maximize energy efficiency while maintaining consistent light level throughout the facility. PlexiPave was also the surface laid down which made the facilities meet NCAA and Pac-10 standards for play.

Along with the upgrades the tennis facility has been named "The Simmelink Courts at Hollingbery Fieldhouse" in honor of Cougar supporter and donor Audrey Simmelink.







Lisa Hart Head Coach Seventh Year

Lisa Hart enters her seventh season as the Washington State head women's tennis coach.

The Cougars' 2008-09 schedule was one of the toughest schedules the Cougars have ever faced. WSU played 16 nationally-ranked opponents, eight of which were Pac-10 opponents

During the 2007-08 season, Hart guided her squad to a 16-10 overall record; the winning record is the third straight for the Cougars. WSU played 13 nationally-ranked opponents, while defeating five of them: No.56 BYU, No.68 Utah, No. 59 Boise State, No.46 Oregon, and No.34 Washington.

The 2006-07 Cougar team entered the year ranked No. 66 nationally. They started off the season with a five match

winning streak which propelled the Cougars to a No. 56 ranking. Wins over No. 30 BYU and No. 47 Sacramento State helped them jump to a season high No. 41 ranking. The Cougars ended the season ranked No. 45 with a record of 14-11.

During the 2005-06 season, Coach Hart led the Cougars to a season high ranking of No. 69. The season was highlighted by three victories over ranked opponents No. 73 Boise State, No. 75 Loyola Marymount and No. 61 South Alabama. Coach Hart led the Cougars to their first winning season since 2000-01 with a record of 14-12.

During the 2004-05 season, Hart led the Cougars to a season high ranking of No. 64, bolstered by upset wins over nationally-ranked San Diego and Santa Clara. The season ended with a 9-14 record and included notable wins against Cal State Northridge, Montana, and Idaho. The Cougars took three nationally-ranked teams to the wire, losing 4-3 to No. 25 BYU, No. 44 Iowa and No. 73 Colorado.

During the 2003-04 season, Hart's first at WSU, the Cougars were ranked No. 51 and captured three wins over ranked opponents. WSU's biggest victory came at No. 23 Oregon in mid-March. The Cougars also defeated Oklahoma State

and San Diego State, both ranked in the top 50 nationally at the time.

During Hart's tenure with the Cougars she has been dedicated to community outreach. She was selected as the regional winner of the 2004, 2005 and 2007 Community Service Award by the United States Tennis Association and Intercollegiate Tennis Association. The award is to honor ITA coaches for their significant contributions in developing community based tennis programs through community centers, schools, parks, community tennis associations, inner city, suburban or rural programs. In December, 2008, Hart was named the national winner of the USTA/ITA Community Outreach Award and was honored by the ITA at its national coaches convention in Naples, Fla.

Currently, Hart is a member of the ITA Northwest Regional Committee and the ITA National Operating Committee for the Northwest Region.

Prior to WSU, Hart spent three seasons at Virginia Tech where she guided the Hokies to a 45-36 record in three seasons including third-place finishes each year in the Big East Conference.

During the 2002-03 season, Hart's Virginia Tech squad concluded the year ranked 69th nationally and eighth in the East region. The Hokies posted victories over No. 27 Oregon, No. 65 Marshall, No. 66 Middle Tennessee State, No. 67 Florida Atlantic and No. 72 Penn State. Hart was a member of the International Tennis Association (ITA) East Region committee from 2001-03 and chaired the committee in 2002-03. The East Region is the largest region in the United States with over 80 schools.

Prior to Virginia Tech, Hart served as the assistant women's tennis coach at the University of Nebraska for two years. While on the Nebraska staff, she helped the Cornhuskers compile a





two year record of 36-13, including a 19-5 record in 2000.

Hart was a tennis standout at Nebraska, finishing her career as one of the most successful women's tennis players in school history. She recorded 74 career singles victories winning the Big 12 Conference No. 2 singles title as a senior.

Hart, the 1995 Big Eight Freshman of the Year, was the first women's tennis player at Nebraska to win a conference singles title since 1978 and only the sixth player in Cornhuskers' history. She was selected to the all-conference team twice and upon graduation her 74 wins ranked No. 3 on the school's career singles victory list.

Her dedication and excellence on the court was matched in the classroom as Hart was a three-time academic allconference selection, earning first-team academic All-Big 12 honors as a senior. She was selected by the Intercollegiate

Tennis Association as the Central Region's "Cissie Learie Sportsmanship Award" winner, one of six throughout the country. As a senior, Hart also received the Arthur Ashe Sportsmanship and Leadership Award.

A native of Sunnyside, Wash., Hart had an outstanding high school career at Sunnyside High where she was a three-time State champion. She also earned All-America honors as a high school sophomore. Hart earned a bachelor's degree in elementary education from Nebraska and also holds a master's degree in education with an emphasis in physical education and sports studies from Nebraska.

Hart and her husband John, an attorney, reside in Pullman with daughter, Mary-Beth and son, Paul.

Assistant Coach Second Year

Ekaterina Burduli enters her second season as the assistant tennis coach for Washington State University.

She will assist head coach Lisa Hart in all aspects of the Cougar Tennis program, including organizing practices, travel and recruiting.

A native of Tel Aviv, Israel, Burduli had arguably the greatest career of any Cougar tennis player. She held down the No. 1 singles position all four seasons at WSU.

She finished the 2008 season with a team-leading 28 victories, the first player in WSU history to register three-straight 20-win seasons. The 28 wins also mark a WSU single-season record. Burduli, who finished the season ranked No. 57 by the Intercollegiate Tennis Association, ended her WSU career with a school-record 90 career singles victories. She led WSU to the NCAA Championships last season for the first time since 2002 while also making her second appearance at the NCAA Singles championships.

"Eka has made a smooth transition into her coaching role



within our program," said WSU Head Coach Lisa Hart. "Her past dedication to our program and its players foreshadows her imminent success as a coach."

Burduli graduated from Washington State University in the spring of 2008 with a bachelor's degree in psychology. She is currently pursuing her doctorate degree in psychology at WSU.

Burduli is a USPTA certified teaching professional.

WOMEN'S TENNIS SEASON PREVIEW

After a challenging 2008-09 season, the women's tennis team looks to grow and build, while taking their play to the next level. During the 08-09 season the Cougs took on 16 ranked opponents, including eight ranked Pacific 10 conference foes. Last season, WSU posted an 8-18 record and were tied for seventh in the Pac-10 with a 1-7 record.


Entering her seventh year as WSU's head coach, Lisa Hart is looking to get the team back on track to a winning season.

"Last season served as a learning experience. Sometimes you can learn more from your losses than your wins and I think that's the case here," Coach Hart said. "As for this season, the returners are hungry to get back to where we want to be and they really want to accomplish a lot. Our returners have done a very nice job of bringing the freshmen up with them and we've noticed a lot more intensity in practices this year."

The Cougars return three key players this year, who will be paired with a talented freshmen class of seven players. With no seniors on the roster, the young team will look to establish itself in a tough conference. Leadership will come from a pair of returning juniors; Jessica Gomez, and Marina Nicolas, and returning sophomore Elisabeth Fournier.

"We've already seen that we have great chemistry in this group. They're ready to go and there is a lot of parody on this team. Everyone can play at any different position and anyone can beat anyone on any given day, which is exciting from a coach's perspective. We have great leaders and the fact that we have no seniors presents the opportunity for this group to be together for a couple years and accomplish some special things," Hart said.

Guadalupe, Mexico native Gomez led the team last season with 13 doubles wins and will continue to play an important role this season. Gomez also earned 12 singles victories on the season. Gomez will take an even bigger leadership role as team captain this season.



"Jessica has been doing an amazing job as team captain and as a leader. Tennis wise, she had a very good fall. She has been in the lineup for some huge wins that our program has had and we'll look to her to bring that experience she has had in those critical matches."

Nicolas, of Zaragoza, Spain, was second on the team in singles victories last season, with 17 wins, including a win against a Pac-10 opponent. She earned 10 doubles victories, which was third best on the team.

"Marina had a great fall. She won another Cougar Classic, her third in a row. Marina has steadily improved since she got here and I'd say right now she's playing the best tennis she's ever played. We're really excited to keep watching Marina progress. She is an amazing athlete and if she continues to improve she will really help us in singles and doubles."

Fournier, a native of Ottowa, Canada led the team in singles victories with 22 in the 2008-09 season, which was the most by a freshman since the 2001 season. Fournier was named the team's most valuable player and will be a key part of the Coug's success this year.

"Liz is like the energizer bunny. She has an unbelievable work ethic on the court and always comes to practice ready to play. She has worked very hard on developing her game and we've noticed a lot of improvement. We expect her to play at the top of our lineup as well, and we're excited to see what January brings for her."

The Cougars will supplement the returning talent with seven new faces who can contribute immediately. The freshmen class will provide the depth needed to take on this season's tough opponents.

Cara Brown, a native of South Bend, Indiana competed in the No.1 spot at Clay High School for three years, earning team MVP awards all four years. Brown was named second team all state and posted a 10-1 record her senior year. Brown posted a 6-3 record during her first fall season as a Coug.

"Cara has an all-court game and she is such a hard worker. We're really excited to help her develop her game more. She doesn't have a tremendous amount of tournament experience, but we've noticed great improvement in practice each week."

Ksenia Googe, from Moscow, Russia, is another freshman who will contribute immediately. She had a career high ranking of No. 394 in the ITF World Junior Rankings and reached the quarterfinals of a number of ITF tournaments in singles and doubles. Googe went 8-3 during her first fall season for WSU.

"Ksenia is a great competitor and a great fighter on the court and she gets a lot of balls back. Her all-court game, especially her net game has been improving, and we're excited to see how good she can get before January."

Lea Jansen, of Valleyford, Wash., joined the Cougar roster in January of 2010. Jansen will compete immediately for playing time after a successful junior career.

"We're really excited about Lea's all court game. We expect her to help us in singles and doubles. She has a big game and we're anxious to get her on campus and adapted to college life and work with her."

Andjela Kankaras, of Niksic, Montenegro, had a career high ITF ranking of No. 390. Kankaras earned the No. 2 spot in Montenegro seniors and held top ten spots in under 18s. As a Cougar, Kankaras won Flight B singles of the Gonzaga Invitational during the fall '09 season.

"Andjela has probably made the biggest improvement though out the fall. We have been working with her on continuing to finish. She will do really well at creating the opportunity but might not finish the point, but this fall she's shown tremendous improvement. She has an all-court game and we expect her to contribute in the lineup in both singles and doubles."

Jackie Owens, a native of Maui, Hawaii, was ranked No.1 as a senior in the USATF Hawaii section. Owens placed second in state her senior year and was named the Hawaii winner of the Wendy's High School Heisman Award. In her first fall season wearing the crimson and gray, Owens won Flight C singles at the Gonzaga Invitational.

"We were really impressed with Jackie's work ethic, especially against outside competition in tournaments. She is definitely a great competitor on match day and she likes to win which her record of 10-2 demonstrates."

Erin Troedson played in No.1 doubles and No.1 and 2 singles at St. Francis High School in Portola Valley, California. Troeson was WCAL champion in doubles and named to second team all-league her junior year. In her first fall season with the Cougars, Troedson won two doubles tournaments with partner Nicolas.

"Erin Troedson is a great doubles player which showed in her results this fall. She has great volleys and a great sense of the court and we're excited to help her continue to develop not only her doubles but singles as well."

Liudmila Vasilieva, from Yekaterinburg, Russia, won singles and doubles at the ITF Samara International Tournament in 2009. Vasilieva had a career high ranking of No. 394 in the World Junior Singles rankings. She posted a team-best 10-1 record in fall play with the Cougs, beating a No.47 ranked opponent from Boise State.

"We expect Luda to contribute right away at singles and doubles at the top of the lineup. She has a huge game and she has already progressed so much this fall. The sky is really the limit for her she has the ability to have an outstanding career here."

The 2009-10 Cougar squad will compete against some of the best in the nation, with 15 opponents ranked at the end of the 2009 season. Seven of WSU's Pac-10 opponents were ranked in the Top 75 at the end of last season, presenting a challenging conference schedule for the team.

Seventeen of WSU's games will be played at home during the 2010 spring season, either in the Hollingbery Field House or at the WSU Outdoor Tennis Center.





Pacific-10 Conference



Entering the 2008-09 season, the Pacific-10 Conference continues to uphold its tradition as the "Conference of Champions." Pac-10 members have claimed an incredible 159 NCAA team titles over the past 18 seasons, for an average of more than eight championships per academic year.

Even more impressive is the breadth of the Pac-10's success, as those 159 team titles have come in 26 different men's and women's sports. The Pac-10 has led the nation in NCAA Championships 42 of the last 48 years and finished second five times.

Spanning nearly a century of outstanding athletics achievement, the Pac-10 has captured 372 NCAA titles (259 men's, 113 women's), far outdistancing the runner-up Big Ten Conference's 217 titles

The Conference's reputation is further proven in the annual United States Sports Academy Directors' Cup competition, the prestigious award that honors the best overall collegiate athletics programs in the country. STANFORD continued its remarkable run in the 2007-08 season, winning its 14th consecutive Directors' Cup. In the 2007-08 competition, eight of the Top-30 Division I programs were Pac-10 members: No. 1 STANFORD, No. 2 UCLA, No. 4 ARIZONA STATE, No. 7 CALIFORNIA, No. 13 USC, No. 22 WASHINGTON, No. 26 OREGON and No. 27 ARIZONA. The Pac-10 landed four programs in the Top-10, one more than the second-place SEC (3).


The Pac-10 captured 13 NCAA titles in 2007-08 to lead the nation, finishing just one shy of the all-time Division I record of 14 titles, set by the Pac-10 in 1996-97. It should be noted that the Pac-10 total does not include CALIFORNIA's national championship in men's rugby or STANFORD's national championship in women's synchronized swimming, as they are not counted as NCAA titles. The Pac-10 led the nation with the most NCAA titles in women's sports with eight.

Participation in the postseason was a common occurrence for the Conference in 2007-08. Of the 22 sports sponsored by the Pac-10, 20 witnessed at least half its teams participating in NCAA or other postseason action. The men sent 73 of a possible 90 teams into the postseason (81.1 percent), while the women sent 74 of a possible 100 teams (74.0 percent).

On the women's side, the story is much the same. Since the NCAA began conducting women's championships 27 years ago, Pac-10 members have claimed at least four national titles in a single season on 19 occasions. Overall, the Pac-10 has captured 113 NCAA women's crowns, easily outdistancing the SEC, which is second with 72. Pac-10 members have dominated a number of sports, winning 20 softball titles, 18 tennis crowns, 13 of the last 18 volleyball titles, 12 of the last 19 trophies in golf and 10 in swimming and diving.

Pac-10 women athletes shine nationally on an individual basis as well, having captured an unmatched 511 NCAA individual titles, an average of more than 18 champions per season.






After two and a half years of career development serving soldiers as an intern in the Army Continuing Education System, Danny has returned to athletics.





Elson S. Floyd

President



Elson S. Floyd is Washington State University's 10th president. He took office in May of 2007 after serving as president of the four-campus University of Missouri System during 2002-2007.

"Excellence, quality, and accountability" are keystones to his administration leading WSU. He puts high priority on WSU being a research leader and having a global presence. Furthermore, he endorses diversity of thought, opinion, perspective, viewpoints, race and ethnicity as characteristics of a world-class university.

Floyd served as president of Western Michigan University from 1999 to 2002, and held several administrative positions at the University of North Carolina Chapel Hill, including deanships in student affairs and the College of Arts and Sciences.

Previously, he spent two years as executive director of the state of Washington Higher Education Coordinating Board, the agency responsible for statewide coordination, planning, oversight, policy analysis and student financial aid programs for Washington's post-secondary education system. From 1990 to 1993, he served as vice president for student services, vice president for administration and executive vice president at Eastern Washington University.

He began his career in 1978 at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill, where he held deanships in the Division of Student Affairs, the General College and the College of Arts and Sciences. From 1988 to 1990, he was assistant vice president for student services for the UNC system office, where he helped develop and articulate student affairs and

academic affairs policy for the 16-campus university system.

A native of Henderson, N.C., Floyd holds a bachelor of arts degree in political science and speech, a master of education degree in adult education, and a doctor of philosophy degree in higher and adult education, all from the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill.

Senior Associate Director of Athletics/SWA



Veteran intercollegiate athletics administrator Anne McCoy has served Washington State University since 2001 and was promoted from associate director to senior associate director of athletics in 2004. Her appointment to senior woman administrator came in the summer of 2007

In her capacity as senior associate director of athletics, she is charged with overseeing all aspects of WSU's athletic budget and supervises several areas with the department including the business office, equipment, computer and football operations, and event management and facility operations. She also serves as a liaison for men's and women's basketball.

McCoy serves on several Pacific-10 Conference committees, including the Senior Woman Administrator and Television Committees and on the Budget and Finance, Compliance and Enforcement, Diversity Leadership Initiative Review, Awards Review, Medical Care, and Student-Athlete Advisory committees. She also been appointed to the NCAA Women's Rowing Committee and is a past vice president of the Pac-10 Conference.

A Wisconsin native, McCoy earned a bachelor's degree in sports management in 1989 from the University of Massachusetts. While an undergraduate, she worked for the Pittsburgh Penguins professional hockey organization, expanding the club's season ticket base. McCoy also served an internship as the assistant athletic business manager at the University of Connecticut, and was instrumental in designing and implementing a comprehensive computerized budget-tracking system.

McCoy served in several capacities at the University of Maine from 1989-1995, lastly as associate director of athletics and senior woman administrator. At Maine, she supervised men's basketball, men's and women's soccer, men's and women's swimming and softball in addition to the athletic business office, ticket office, retail store and cheerleading staff and operations. She took a similar administrative positive at St. Louis University from 1995-96.

In 1996, McCoy moved west, joining the staff at Portland State University as associate director of athletics and senior woman administrator, and was promoted to senior associate director of athletics in 1998. At PSU, she managed all internal staff and the daily operations of the department, representing the director of athletics as needed. McCoy also supervised men's and women's golf, cross country/track and field, and women's volleyball, soccer, tennis and softball.

Faculty Athletics Representative



Professor Ken Casavant, a member of the Washington State University family since 1967, currently serves as WSU's Faculty Athletics Representative to the Pacific-10 Conference and the National Collegiate Athletic Association. He is a past president of the Pac-10 and most recently served on the NCAA Division I Management Council.

Casavant came to WSU as a graduate research assistant in the Department of Agricultural and Resource Economics. He was named an assistant professor in 1971, an associate professor in 1975 and a full professor in 1980.

In 2004, Casavant received the Shalin

Exellence award for Leadership for the University, having had the honor several years earlier of giving the Distinguished Faculty Address, the University's oldest award and also receiving the Sahlin Excellence in Public Service award for the University. Bill Moos

Director of Athletics



william H. (Bill) Moos, a WSU Distinguished Alumnus Award recipient, was named Director of Athletics at Washington State University, Feb. 24, 2010.

Moos, 59, has enjoyed a long and distinguished career in collegiate athletics, most recently as the University of Oregon director of athletics from 1995-2007. While at Oregon he oversaw a 17-sport athletic department that grew to national prominence during his tenure.

Oregon's annual athletic department budget grew from \$18.5 million in his first year to more than \$40 million by 2007, becoming 100 percent self-sufficient

during that time. Under his direction the Duck Fund donor base increased from 4,930 to 12,290, resulting in an annual gifts increase from \$4.1 million to \$15.3 million.

Moos initiated more than \$160 million in facility improvements while at Oregon. Included in that were the \$90 million Autzen Stadium renovation in 2002, which added 12,000 new seats, 32 new suites, a new Club at Autzen and a new press box to the stadium. In his 12 years the Ducks ranked first in Pac-10 football attendance 11 times, reaching 100 percent capacity in each of those seasons. The only season Oregon did not lead the conference in attendance, 1997, they finished second, averaging 92 percent capacity for the year.

Additional facility improvements included the opening of the \$14.6 million Ed Moshofsky Sports Center and Papé and Kilkenny Fields project, the installation of a \$4 million Opto Tech Megavision scoreboard in Autzen Stadium, as well as an expansion of the varsity athletic weight room, both indoor and outdoor tennis facilities, and renovations to McArthur Court and Hayward Field.

During Moos' tenure, Oregon athletics captured 13 Pac-10 championships across six different sports. He increased opportunities for women by adding two intercollegiate programs, soccer and lacrosse, and negotiated an all-inclusive shoe and apparel contract with Nike, one of only 14 in the country at the time.

From an academic standpoint during Moos' tenure, Oregon student-athletes collected 722 academic all-conference selections, 34 Academic All-America selections, nine NCAA post Graduate Scholars and one NCAA Top VIII Award.





Moos assumed the duties of director of athletics in July 1995, after five years in the same position at the University of Montana.

During his Montana tenure, he created an academic support ¬program and hired its first athletic academic coordinator, developed a facility enhancement plan that created more than \$4 million in improvements, and lifted the school's fund-raising efforts to show a 300 percent in¬crease in private and corporate gifts.

Moos began his athletics career in 1982 as assistant athletics director at Washington State University and also served as the school's associate director (1988-90). The 1973 Washington State graduate was a Pacific-8 all-conference offensive lineman in 1972.

At Washington State, he was director of development for more than five years and associate director for nearly two years, supervising all external operations. Prior to that, he managed and owned private businesses in Washington and Oregon for eight years.

Raised on a wheat and cattle ranch in eastern Washington, Moos attended high school in Olympia when his father served in the governor's cabinet.

Moos earned his bachelor's degree in history from WSU and was a three-year letterman in football before concluding his collegiate career by representing Washington State in the 1972 East-West Shrine all-star game in San Francisco. He served as co-captain on the Cougars' 1972 squad and garnered All-Pac-8 Conference First Team honors.

Moos and his wife Kendra have three daughters: Christa, Brittany and Kaiti; and two sons, Bo and Benjamin.

Paul Wulff became WSU's 31st head

football coach in December, 2007, when he returned to his alma mater after spending the previous eight years as head coach at Eastern Washington University. Wulff has assembled a 55-51 in his nine-year head coaching career, including three postseason appearances.

Andrew Palileo, 2nd Year

Dedicated to rebuilding the Cougar volleyball program back to national prominence, Andrew Palileo ended his first season at WSU with the team winning three of the final four matches in the Pac-10 schedule. The WSU volleyball coaching staff has tirelessly hit the recruiting trails and the results will soon be evident on the court.



SOCCER Matt Potter, 7th Year

Matt Potter, in his seventh season, has led Washington State to five-straight winning seasons, an unprecedented feat for Cougar soccer since joining the Pacific-10 Conference. His 55 victories are a school record. Last season, he led the Cougars to the their first postseason berth since 2002. He has coached 19 all-conference honorees and 72 Pac-10 All-Academic award recipients.



SWIMMING Erica Quam, 8th Year

During her seven years at Washington State, three Erica Quam coached teams have scored points at the NCAA Championships. Last season, the Cougars sent three student-athletes to the NCAA Championships, a first for the program. Under her leadership, WSU swimmers have set 19 school records, and garnered 75 Pac-10 All-Academic honors, including 25 first team accolades.



MEN'S BASKETBALL Ken Bone, 1st Year

The 17th head coach in Cougar Basketball history, Ken Bone brings 17 years of head coaching experience with him to the Palouse, including the last four at Portland State. A Washington native, Bone took PSU to consecutive NCAA Tournaments his last two seasons with the Vikings (2008 and 2009), marking the only appearances in school history.



WOMEN'S BASKETBALL June Daugherty, 3rd Year

June Daugherty, in her third season leading the Cougars, brought a wealth of experience in building winning programs. In her first season Daugherty brought in one of the nation's topranked recruiting classes and more than tripled home attendance. Last year she orchestrated one of the nation's top 30 turnarounds, measured in both wins and jump in RPI. Daugherty is looking to take her third different school to the NCAA Tournament.



MEN'S GOLF Walt Williams, 12th Year

Since taking over the WSU men's and women's golf programs in 1998, Walt Williams' teams have re-written the record books and crowned two All-Americans. Both the men's and women's teams have competed in the NCAA West Regionals during his tenure. Williams is the winningest coach in school history, compiling a total of 27 team titles, including one in 2008-09.



WOMEN'S GOLF Kelli Kamimura, 1st Year

Kelli Kamimura is in her first season as the head women's golf coach at WSU. A native of Burlington, Wash. (Sedro Woolley HS), she was also a two-time All-American during her collegiate playing days at Washington.



TENNIS Lisa Hart, 7th Year

The Cougar tennis program, under the direction of seventh-year head coach Lisa Hart, has been nationally ranked each of the last six seasons and has recorded 14-plus wins in three of the last four years. In 2008 the Cougars reached the NCAA tournament for the first time since the 2002 season.



BASEBALL Don Marbut, 6th Year

Don Marbut, is in his sixth year as WSU's head coach and seventh with the program. In 2009, he skippered the Cougars to their first NCAA postseason since 1990. He has mentored 14 Major League Baseball draft picks and led the Cougars to a national ranking in three of the last four seasons.

Jane LaRiviere, 8th Year

Jane LaRiviere has led her teams to four NCAA Championships in her seven years at WSU, including twice in the last four seasons. In 2008 the Cougars finished eighth at the NCAA Championships, only bettered by her squad's fourth-place finish in 2006. LaRiviere was awarded Pac-10 and CRCA West Regional Coach-of-the-Year honors in 2006.

Rick Sloan is the dean of WSU coaches, having been with the program for 36 years, including the last 14 as head coach of both the men's and women's programs. He has directed 38 WSU athletes to NCAA Outdoor All-America status 67 times and mentored 29 Cougar athletes to NCAA Indoor All-America status 44 times.


